# WHAT LIES BENEATH IS IMPORTANT

Every farmer has them but not every farmer knows what goes on underneath them.

We are talking about pastures and particularly soils.

And while we can see what grows on top what lies beneath is often an unknown.

The Strathbogie Tableland Landcare Group, with the Goulburn Broken Catchment Management Authority and the DPI with funding from *Caring for Our Country* set out to address the question of "How Does My Pasture Grow" at a Soil Management Field Day held last week on David Hamilton's Bolarum property at Strathbogie.

Three soil pits have been excavated on the property down to a depth of nominally one metre to expose the soil profile in different positions to inform on how the soil structure and its management directly influences air, water and root penetration, affecting the pasture growth and productivity.

Three soil scientists from the DPI, David Rees, Cath Botta and Brad Costin along with consultant Peter Ockenden informed the forty or so attendees since the soil condition will be the single most important factor that determines how well pasture can grow in the Strathbogie Tablelands which are mainly granitic.

Most farmers when looking at or thinking about their soils focus only on the top 10cm, since that is the zone most able to be influenced through short term management issues.

The speakers noted "however the roots of the plant explore the soil at much greater depths and the health of the soil down the profile has a major impact on the thrift and long term survival of pastures".

At the Soil Management Field Day attendees looked at the soil profile, how it changes in position in the landscape (often determined by slopes and gradients) and the chemical and physical characteristics of the soil that affect plant growth.

Those present were given the opportunity to become proficient in a few simple soil tests to enable soils to be looked at in greater detail.

The simple tests were to identify the

soil characteristics including the elements of sand, silt and clay, soil texture, stability, colour and its pH.

A Rapid Soil Assessment Tool (RSAT Kit) was also provided so that farmers can determine and record their own soil conditions and in turn formulate appropriate responses which may include choice of grasses, additives of fertilisers or lime and cultivation.

So if you see a large excavator at work in your neighbour's paddock you can probably assume that the mysteries of soils and their constituents are under investigation!

A second project the Strathbogie Alternative Fertiliser Trial that is trialling all those commercial compounds that are frequently advertised in the rural pages is also underway on David Hamilton's farm.

Also being conducted by local farmers and the Strathbogie Tablelands Landcare Group it is scheduled to take three years to enable meaningful conclusions to be drawn.

A Field Day will be offered later in the year to both inform land owners and reveal some early results.

Watch for it if you have an interest in those mystical compounds some of which include seaweed, bioorganics and even worm juice!



#### **FOX CONTROL**

## Preventative control: integrating options

You need to approach the concept of fox control in the same manner used to successfully control rabbits. No single technique will provide effective longterm protection of your livestock. Programs should be planned in advance and wherever possible be integrated to include a variety of techniques such as poisoning, shooting and den fumigation. As foxes are very mobile, widely distributed with the ability to quickly move throughout an area, control is rarely effective if carried out in isolation. A group of landholders tackling the whole problem in a simultaneous and coordinated manner is likely to be more successful than isolated individuals tackling only part of the problem. These programs therefore should also be conducted on a co-ordinated landholder group or district wide basis in order to maximise long-term fox con-

#### **Husbandry methods**

Small lambing paddocks should be used to allow easier monitoring of the flock and reduce the chances of young lambs being left unattended a long way from their mothers. Lambing paddocks sited close to the homestead are also easier to check frequently. Shed lambing can be a practical means of preventing fox predation on small flocks of valuable animals. Some producers have successfully used trained guard dogs (eg. Anatolian shepherds, Maremma sheep dogs) to protect their flocks from fox predation. Carcasses of stock/native animals must at all times of the year be removed and/or destroyed in accordance with the Directions for the Use of 1080 Pest Animal Bait Products in Victoria.

## Use of 1080 poison baits

The use of 1080 pest animal baits products, when implemented correctly, is an effective method of controlling foxes. 1080 pest animal bait products can only be purchased by authorised persons. Users of 1080 pest animal bait products must adhere to the requirements on the product label and the Directions for the Use of 1080 Pest Animal Bait Products in Victoria.
