BITS OF BOTANY & BIRDS

A TALL TREE STORY

In the early 1930s my father was working for Richard Meggitt, who lived at 'Glenfern', Terip Terip.

The Meggitts had properties in Ruffy, Terip and several in Caveat.

At one of the Caveat properties, a new strainer post was required in the fence line. After a brief look around it was decided to use the Yellow Box tree which was growing a short distance from the fence. The job of felling the tree and cutting the strainer post was up to my father alone and all he had to work with was an axe, a shovel, a crowbar and a cross-cut saw. The tree stood at a gateway to some good fishing spots on the Hughes Creek.

Some days later, Christopher (Chris) Richards, a good friend of the Meggitt family came through the old gateway to do some fishing and there he met my father. Chris offered to get on the other end of the cross-cut saw to help fell the tree. According to my father the tree was about 18 inches in diameter and after it came down there was still a small sucker branch growing from the stump.

Now, some 80 years later, this sucker branch would be close to 2 metres in diameter, it has completely encased the stump and it supports a magnificent Yellow Box that would be over 100 feet tall.

As it was a very dry season back in 1932, the Meggitt family built a 'rabbiter's hut" approximately 1/2 km from this tree near a creek with a good water supply. The chimney from this hut still stands today. After the hut was built, Chris moved in to it and trapped rabbits as they were a good price at that time. He was very happy there, but he didn't have a mailbox or anywhere for his groceries to be left so he decided he'd build one using the top end left-overs from the strainer post wood. This mailbox was large enough to sit in, roughly 3ft square by 4ft high, clad with corrugated & flat iron. It was painted brown with a name on it "DRIAZELL".

Unfortunately, there is now a large vertical split in the Yellow Box tree that looks like it's going to self-prune.

Great to see the regular stories and anecdotes on our wonderful wildlife in *The Granite News*.

As a fairly regular visitor to the Ruffy area bird-watching, I too have detected many species of fascinating birds. Highlights have been a Powerful Owl, Painted Honeyeater, Brush Cuckoo and Hooded Robin. Your correspondent Lesley Dalziel mentioned observing the Yellow-plumed Honeyeater. This is certainly a bird normally only observed in the NW of Victoria, being recorded in southern and eastern Victoria in dry years only rarely. The 'Curlew' (Bush Stone-curlew) and Barking Owl Lesley mentions are some of Victoria's most rare and threatened woodland birds, so Lesley's observations are important sightings to pass on to the main plant and animal database - the Victorian Biodiversity Atlas (VBA). I encourage readers to send any interesting sightings (of all animals) onto the VBA via myself. I can send interested observers recording forms if it helps.

TIME OF THE SIGNS

About four years ago, a council sign appeared outside Habbies Howe saying "Rough Road Ahead" and I thought to myself "what a waste of a sign....they're all rough roads around here".

Within a day or so someone crashed their way over and through the rough road. I thought "how could you not see the sign?"

That morning, I drove to Seymour and I began to wonder if I was suffering from OCD because I started counting the signs.

Signs go left; go right; curves; bridge signs; speed signs; T intersection; Neighbourhood Watch; school bus stopping and the list went on.

In 25 kilometres there were over 100 signs; that's one every 250 metres. Admittedly the Highlands Road has a lot of bridges and Eddie McGuire has managed to get Collingwood's colours on the end of every one, but that bit of visual pollution aside, the fact is that each sign costs about \$400 to install. So that's about \$40,000 of public money spent that most people hardly notice.

It reminds me of the old saying "you can't see the forest for the trees".

My 2nd favourite "Library is closed until opening time"

Recently I drove into Ruffy to be confronted by brand new 50 KPH signs. But those signs are preceded by what I regard as bureaucratic overkill, there are also enormous signs telling you there is another sign ahead!

Incensed by what I had witnessed, I approached a local about this blight on the landscape only to be reassured that they weren't really signs but windbreaks disguised as signs. That made me feel a whole lot better!

I'm not necessarily picking on Ruffy (though that it is one of my great pleasures) but I can't imagine the amount of time consumed on community consultation, the reporting to and approval from all of the different levels of government, the bureaucratic paperwork culminating in the significant cost to the taxpayer that must have gone in to the final decision to install those signs.

Ruffy is a great place but it's not exactly a thriving metropolis. But why stop there?

Let's have a pedestrian crossing with traffic lights. (I might live to regret saying that).

Apparently sign overload is not a new problem as the "Five Man Electrical Band" sang in 1971

"Sign, sign, everywhere a sign Blockin' out the scenery, breakin' my mind Do this, don't do that, can't you read the sign?"

I think I've had enough and I'm going to start a movement against signs and as my first act I'm going to put up a whole heap of Anti-Sign signs.


