Early Settlement in Highlands

The Dropmore run of 10,000ha in the Parish of Dropmore was originally part of Avenel station, and was taken up by J.H.Webster in 1841.

In 1849, it was transferred to the Ruffy Bros. Also in 1841, Habbies Howe of 4,000 ha in the Parish of Kobyboyn, was occupied by George Taylor and Gideon Stewart, from Kenilworth in Tasmania. They arrived with 500 sheep and 500 pounds.

In 1869, an act of Parliament decreed that these large properties be subdivided into 320 acre blocks, but the original occupiers were allowed to retain 640 acres as a pre-emptive right.

Henry Lade from Strath Creek selected allotments 1 and 2 in the Parish of Kobyboyn in 1882. About the same time, John, Murdock and Ken Yorston, also from Strath Creek, obtained selections.

Next to come to Highlands were the MacAlpin and Chisholm families from Emu Flat. Joe and Francis Zoch, from Arcadia, selected blocks at Caveat and Highlands.

The Minchinton family came from Corop to Caveat, and Ted Minchinton's daughter, Joyce Waddell, still lives at the homestead. These six pioneer families are commemorated by the six granite pillars at the Highlands crossroads. This stone circle was erected in 1982 to mark the centenary of Highlands. By Doug Lade

OUR FIRST INTERVIEW WITH A LOCAL

Dennis Spiteri is a talented and original artist, who "discovered" his 46 acres at Highlands in 1997, after 20 years of looking for land all over Victoria. Dennis spent the first 6 years of his life in Malta. He then moved to Gippsland with his parents, and all his life he knew he was destined to becoming an artist in spite of his parents urging him to "get a proper job". However, they realised his dedication, and he studied at the Prahran College of Technology and the National Gallery School for his final year. In 1970 he held his first exhibition, which was almost a sell out. One picture is in the National Gallery in Canberra, and one in the Burwood Campus of Deakin University. At this time, he had discovered classical music, particularly Bee-

thoven's music, and this made an enormous impact on his work. His paintings are huge, and seriously based on music by Sibelius, Bach, and others, with his belief that "All arts aspire to the condition of music".

Dennis believed that Germany was his spiritual home, and he intended to live and work there. A series of incredible personal tragedies eventually brought him back to Australia. Here he worked at what he calls "bread and butter jobs", one of which was 20 years at the State Library, while continuing with, and developing his painting. He became disillusioned with the art world in Melbourne, and here he is, at Highlands.

He built an impressive gallery to house and exhibit his paintings and to continue his work. His life's dream has become a reality. To say that the gallery takes one's breath away is no exaggeration.

Situated on Dennis's own land, with a superb view to the west, and a collection of staggering colours and shapes on the walls. Recently, Dennis and his wife Margaret Millburn ,who teaches Art at Seymour Technical High School and is a creative potter, have hosted a series of private film viewings. These have included "Cinema Paradiso", one of Dennis's favourite films, which he claims to have watched nearly 1000 times! Currently, Dennis is working on a series of paintings entitled "Song of the Earth", inspired by nature and the composer ,Mahler. To visit the gallery is an amazing and almost spiritual experi-

The gallery will be open on March 3 and 4, as part of the Hi-Arts exhibition at Highlands and is not to be missed. The "Four Seasons" series, painted in 1976, will be shown at this time.

BITS OF BOTANY AND BIRDS.

Many years ago, Doug came in and said "I've seen the smallest bird in the world!" Further investigation identified

this as the Golden- Headed Cisticola, only 9 to 11.5 cms in length. It lives in rank growth around wetlands and swamps, and breeding males call incessantly from grass tops, fences, and electricity wires with an insect-like buzz. It

has a small, domed nest, with a side entrance, in low shrubs, tussocks or rushes, and breeds from September to March. I thought it had disappeared from our swamps, but I was delighted to find it buzzing away this summer. By Peg Lade




