When Alistair died suddenly and tragically, Helen continued with the restaurant and called it "Helen's". However, it was in the wrong place for the times, Yea being in its Fast Food Phase. Helen then started making pickles and jams. About this time, she met Doug Maclean, the Ruffy shop was for sale, and they "moved into town"! Now, Helen says she is doing the "Alistair bit", and being encouraged and supported all the way by marvellous Doug. Helen's greatest joy at the Ruffy Store is what she calls "knitting it all up" - meeting people and introducing them to each other, and getting huge pleasure from it all. And so are we!

FARTH HOUR 7.30pm to 8.30pm Saturday March 31, 2007

Earth Hour is a fabulous opportunity for you and your family to do something about climate change. On one night, in one hour, more will be done, more will be demonstrated, and more will be learned than through a hundred 'talk-fests'. And you can help make it happen.

What is Earth Hour?

It sounds simple, but it is very, very dramatic. At 7.30pm on March 31st 2007, we will be encouraging companies, government departments, individuals and families to turn off their lights for just one hour. If we meet our objectives during the first Earth Hour, the savings in green house gas emissions will be the equivalent of taking 75,000 medium sized cars off the road for one whole year! BITS OF BOTANY AND BIRDS

SILVER BANKSIA (Banksia marginata)

The Silver Banksia grows as a shrub to a small tre. The leaf margins have small serrations, and the flowers occur in cylindrical spikes, 50-100 mms long. The seeds are attached to a woody cone, and propagation can be from seeds or cuttings. The only naturally occurring specimens that I know of, in our area, are in a creek gully at Dropmore, at the Bottom Falls on Stoney Creek, Highlands (very hard to get to!), on the old Yarck cutting, and some fabulous old, old trees on the road near the Ruffy Recreation Reserve. Many specimens grown from local seed have been planted on the roads near Highlands, and I have a healthy tree in my garden, which is much loved by honeyeaters. Banksias were named after Sir Joseph Banks, who collected the first specimens in 1770. (Peg Lade)



Agricultural Chemical Users Permit (ACUP)

To use restricted chemicals a person must hold an ACUP or to be under direct supervision of an ACUP holder

How to Apply

1. Different chemicals require different training.

For methyl bromide the 'Fumigation using methyl bromide' course must be completed.

For pindone concentrate the 'Pest animal management course' course must be completed.

For any other type of use restricted chemical a DPI recognised course such as the Agsafe Personnel Accreditation course, ChemCert Agvet Chemical Training Course or another DPI recognised equivalent must be completed.

To find out what organisations offer these training courses and where they are run, contact TAFE colleges, VCAH colleges, Chemcert or Agsafe.
