She also speaks fluent French, Italian, Spanish and a smattering of local African dialects, and she swears very satisfactorily in Arabic. Now Yolande is teaching French in Yea at the Community House and hopes to expand. She does voluntary work in Yea and at Highlands Primary . She also paints in a variety of styles and different medias. She is certainly a bubbling personality with a great sense of humour, she has already made many friends and we hope she stays here for a long time.

BITS OF BOTANY AND BIRDS

The WHITE-EARED HONEYEATER. A regular visitor to the sugar feeders in my garden is the Whiteared Honeyeater. At this time of year, when few nectar producing plants are flowering, the honeyeaters really appreciate a good slurp of a sugar solution, in unglazed terracotta bowls, hanging from branches of shrubs and trees. The White-Eared Honeyeater has olive green back and yellow-olive front, a large white ear patch , with a black face and grey crown. It sometimes chases away the smaller birds, but in turn, it is constantly harrassed at the bird feeders by the more numerous New Holland Honeyeaters and the larger Wattle birds.


