INTERVIEW WITH THE WALLIS FAMILY

The first Wallis to arrive in Seymour was Henry Wallis. Born 1822 in England, he arrived in NSW in 1838 and Seymour 6 years later,

He married Mary Dempsey, and settled in Seymour and had 13 children. 9 living to adulthood. They took up land near the present High St and railway underpass, the township of Seymour then being on the river at Emily St. The present Wallis St being a reminder of this.

A great deal of information is known about other members of the family, the Wallis' who still live around Whitehead's creek today are the descendants of Henry(Harry) 6th born of Henry and Mary in 1855.

Harry married Annie Orme in 1890.

Her father built Fairholme on the Kobyboyn Rd, where she grew up.

Harry was always a farmer. He leased The Pines, on the corner of Kobyboyn Rd and Wine Shanty Lane. He took up land at Eaglehawke and built a slab hut. He bought Warrawee land from the bank and brought the slab hut down so their children could go to school at Whiteheads Creek. He served as a Shire councillor.

Harry and Annie had 6 children, 3 reaching adulthood. These being Frank (B.1892), Alfred (B. 1895) and Louisa.(B 1900).

The families of Frank and Alfred live in

the area today. Both these went to WW1 and returned to farm. Frank stayed at Warrawee and Alfred moved to Fairholme (next door) where his mother had grown up.

Frank and Grace Married in 1924 and had 2 children, Robert (B1926) and Pauline. Bob has farmed at Warrawee all his life and still lives there, his son Tony lives in the Warrawee homestead built by Harry and Annie in 1914

Alfred farmed Fairholme all his life and lived there into his 90's. He married Marion Pater in 1922 and had 3 children Jean, Barbara and Jock.

Jock Wallis and Barbara Smith and their families still live in the district making their grandchildren the 6th generation, an impressive time span for any family in one area.

Of Barbara sons, Philip now has Fairholm and Greg runs 'Greenslopes' on the Goulburn River at Traawool

Jock spent some time up at Eaglehawke as a young man, rabbiting with a large pack of dogs. He tells of having to light a fire on the hill top each evening which his mother down at Fairholme could see and would know he was safe.

Jock married Margaret Briggs (Alexandra)in 1951 and moved into Eastwood, next door to Fairholme where they live today. Jock and Margaret have always been and still are very involved in many community activities. Jock and son Richard still run Eastwood along with Richard's farm 'Granite Hills' at Highlands.

This is the bare bones of the Wallis' story at Whitehead's Creek. As with all families, it is often the smallest details which are of most fascination.

I've had a number of interesting bird sightings this week, the most unusual being a BASSIAN THRUSH crossing the road near Wattle Hill at Highlands. This is a plump brownish bird a bit bigger than a blackbird, and with dark, half-moon shaped patterns on its whitish front. It skulks in undergrowth or stands motionless, and is very hard to see. This bird is also called White's Thrush or Mountain Thrush.

On our Ramble on Hughes Creek on Sunday, someone with sharp eyes noticed a SOUTHERN BOOBOOK OWL perched on a very high branch of a Eucalypt tree. It obligingly stayed very still, only moving its head from side to side as if to say "What on earth are you doing here in my remote and beautiful gorge"!
