INTERVIEW WITH A

CHRIS BENNETT of "ANTCLIFFE'S CHASE" vineyard, at CAVEAT.

Chris was born the only child of John and Nonie Bennett, spending most of his childhood in the suburban "bush" of East Ringwood, where he got his first taste of country. He was a foundation pupil at Yarra Valley School, and a holiday at Yarra Glen re-enforced his love of the bush. After a trip to Europe with his parents, Chris did a 3-year farming course at Dookie College. He became involved in replanting the College vineyard, and trips to and from Melbourne became explorations of back roads which was how he discovered Caveat. He decided that there was his destiny. Two years of travelling and working in Europe and USA followed, Chris's father retired early and they planted 14 acres of vines at Caveat. Some locals told them they "would never grow vines here!", this being the first vineyard in the area. The Fernlea vineyard, close by, was planted soon after. Riesling, Cabernet, Chardonnay and Pinot Noir were planted, and have been extremely successful, in spite of the challenges of infertile soils and a harsh climate.

Chris realised he would not get big crops, but has achieved a good balance, and a profitable enterprise. He prunes himself, (until I get sick of it, says Chris), then employs a local team. Picking is done by hand, and Chris makes all his own wine.

Marketing is via cellar door, some to retail outlets, and Chris started an Australia-wide "Scarecrow Wine Club" which is a good marketing ploy.

Chris's best mate, his father, John, died in 1985, and Nonie still lives in the main house.

Chris said the best thing in his life happened when he met Susan, they married, built a house, had the biggest vintage ever, and by the end of that year, Chris's 40th, the first of their 3

BITS OF BOTANY AND BIRDS

ACACIA (Wattle) is the largest genus of flowering plants in Australia, with about 985 species, ranging from Acacia aculeatissima (Thin-leaf Wattle - a ground hugging species) to tall forest trees.

SILVER WATTLE is our local most common species, which is coming into its golden glory along the Goulburn and other local rivers. It is critical habitat for gliders and possums, and is also a food plant for caterpillars of native butterflies and moths, which in turn attract insect-eating birds such as the Scrubwren. Wattle is our National floral emblem, and part of Australia's Coat of Arms.

News from the Highlands/ Caveat Road Committee

Following our contact with the Shire and the Community Meeting in July there have been some positive developments.

The Shire has agreed to seal a 200 metre section of Dropmore Rd. on the bend near the Kopanica property and a 200 metre section of Gum Rd some 2.2km from the southern intersection with Highlands Rd (Fernleigh end).

It is hoped that weather permitting etc. this should be done in December 2007

It would seem that the shire will also alter the Gum Rd. Highlands Rd intersection into a proper T junction.

The Road Committee is presently in discussions re the clarifying the names of roads, particularly in the Caveat area. Eventually a community consultation will need to take place before it can be finalised.

Conversations are also taking place to rationalise and improve the road signage throughout the area.

Indicator posts are also soon to be placed on the bends of the Ghin Ghin Rd. This should help in fogs. For any further information contact Roads Committee Convener Stuart Reid 5796 9358.

Members of Whiteheads Creek Landcare Group recently gave Roger Lilley a neighbourly hand with stage one of his project to rehabilitate parts of his property at the end of the Old Ghin Ghin road, in a locality known as the Basin.

Roger had collected 65 species of plants suitable for the area carefully following the revegetation guides. Each tube was coded with numbers that needed to be matched to a numbered stake, which marked the position for planting. This proved very challenging to the planters as they searched "Planting Area 3" for A16 or B24, rather like a treasure hunt. This greatly hampered our usual planting speed especially David's. Extra tall stakes and plastic guards were used to deter vermin. Weed control will keep Roger busy for many years to come.

Thanks to David Freeman, John Thompson, Neville Ford, James Matters & Janet from Landcare, planting areas 1,2,3,4,5,6,7 & 8 were completed on Sunday.
