NEW STRATHBOGIE RANGES CMN STARTS

A small community group met in mid December 2010 to start working on the establishment of the brand new 'Strathbogie Ranges Conservation Management Network Inc.' We are now an incorporated body with a Statement of Purpose and an ABN. This means that the Strathbogie Ranges CMN can now apply for funding grants in its own right and set up a bank account.

Statement of Purpose

- 1. To help optimize conservation of the biological diversity of ecological communities in the area known as the "Strathbogie Ranges CMN area"
- 2. To help maintain or enhance viable remnants of the ecological communities throughout their distribution on public and private land in the Strathbogie Ranges CMN area.
- 3. To help protect, restore and reestablish threatened ecological communities in the Strathbogie Ranges CMN area
- 4. To contribute to the maintenance of ecological processes and the dynamics of the ecological community across the landscape in the Strathbogie Ranges CMN area.
- 5. To help to increase the protection status of sites within the Strathbogie Ranges CMN area; in particular for those with threatened ecological communities that are under-represented in the public reserve system.
- 6. To promote sustainable land management that protects biodiversity within the Strathbogie Ranges CMN area.
- 7. To enhance community ownership and encourage ownership of the local environment within the Strathbogie Ranges CMN area.
- 8. To provide a network for all land managers, groups interested in conservation, environment, biodiversity and land management as well as other interested stakeholders.
- 9. To integrate conservation into management by empowerment with knowledge and resources.
- 10. To share knowledge between landholders, scientists, conservation planners and managers.
- 11. To encourage consistent and/or complimentary management across sites.

The CMN covers areas within the boundaries of the Hume HWY, Midland HWY, Maroondah HWY & Goulburn Valley HWY.

Members can include any community members interested in biodiversity conservation: Landcare, Trust for Nature, Land for Wildlife, Field Naturalists, Birds Australia, Environmental Groups, Euroa Arboretum, Australian Plant Growers Society, Artists and Historians, VFF, Traditional Owners, plus representatives from government agencies: DPI, Parkvic, DSE & CMA. The GBCMA have granted \$25,000 for the establishment of the CMN in 2010/2011.

An expression of interest has submitted by the committee to the GBCMA for funding of a part time facilitator in 2011/2012. Closing date for this EOI is Friday 21st January 2011.

It is now time to plan directions and activities for the coming year.

The next meeting will be held on Saturday 5th February. 12.30 pm at the Euroa Arboretum

We will begin with a BBQ lunch and drinks which the CMN will supply. (Please let us know of any special dietary requirements) then continue with an informal meeting in the afternoon to discuss the next stages in our development.


There are only 4 spaces left on the back of the newsletter which is fabulous. Thank you so much to all the people who have chosen to join us and to help keep this newsletter alive.

Common Onion orchid Microtis unifolia

This orchid has been more common this summer than I've ever seen before. In December we had hundreds growing in our paddocks and in the bush. Unfortunately, it's probably the most boring orchid known to man. The plant consists of a stalk from about 20cm to 50 cm in height and one grass or onionlike leaf blade. The dozens of tiny tubular green flowers with insignificant petals hug the main stalk on all sides. The plants can still be found but both stalk and flowers are brown now.

BASIL (Ocimum basilicum)

Basil is an annual herb which grows to about 0.5m and it takes its name from the Latin word for king, 'basileum' as it was considered the king among plants. Basil grows wild all over the Mediterranean and is highly valued in cooking and as a medicinal herb. It can even be found at the foot of pulpits in Greek churches. Although many of us associate basil with the Mediterranean it is native to tropical Asia and Africa and has a long history in Indian traditional medicine.

Basil is steam distilled from its leaves and flowers and is a pale yellow to pale green in colour. It has an intense aniseed-like aroma due to its methyl chavicol content(40% to 50%).

Basil is a great memory and mental stimulant as it helps relieve intellectual fatigue and give the mind strength and clarity. Other uses for Basil also include digestive disorders. Massaging a blend of Basil essential oil and a carrier oil such as grapeseed over the stomach it may aid in the relief of digestive problems due to it being an antispasmodic, over the abdominal area helps relieve cramping and scanty periods. It also beneficial in the relief of sinus congestion, asthma and bronchitis.
