BITS OF BOTANY AND BIRDS

Indian Myna

This introduced bird will be familiar to anyone who has lived in Melbourne, but so far it's been slow to move into rural areas. Unfortunately, some may have been seen at Dropmore recently. Mynas are a serious threat to native birds and hollow-nesting mammals, aggressively taking over many more nest sites than they need themselves, killing young and destroying eggs. They are thrush-sized, chocolate body with black head and bright yellow beak and skin around the eye. When in flight a white wing patch is very noticeable.

BLACK PEPPER

Black pepper is a perennial vine climbing to about 5m, the inflorescence is a spike of about 20 to 30 sessile flowers which develop into the fruits. The fruits on a spike do not mature at the same time so harvest time is when only a few fruits are ripe. These ripe fruits are fermented, soaked in running water, dried then powdered to give us white pepper. The unripe fruit is what we get black pepper from after they have been soaked in hot water then sun dried. The black pepper is more pungent due to the presence of resins and a crystalline alkaloid called piperine. It is native to southern India and Indonesia. It is one of the oldest known spices and gets its name from the Latin 'piper'. In the middle ages pepper was very expensive and accepted as currency.

The oil of black pepper is obtained by steam distillation of the dried and crushed, not quite ripe fruits of the pepper vine. It is clear to pale greenish in colour and has a dry woody, warm spicy odour. Its main chemical compositions are a-pinene, camphene, limonene and terpinene.

Black Pepper works well on the circulatory system and is recommended in the treatment of anemia due to its stimulating effect on the spleen which takes part in the development of red blood cells. Good for treating chilblains. With properties such as stomachic, antispasmodic and carminative it makes an excellent oil for disorders of the digestive system like dyspepsia, constipation and flatulence. It is also valuable in a blend for the relief of rheumatism and arthritis, muscular aches and pains, tired and aching limbs and muscle stiffness. Councillor Comment Cr Sally Abbott Smith, Cheviot Ward

Cats are highly valued pets in Murrindindi Shire households – nearly 30 per cent of homes have one. Cats are highly adaptable and flexible and fit into domestic life and routines easily and comfortably.

Cats are however, predators by nature and will go looking for mates, defend territory and hunt wildlife, particularly during the dusk to dawn period. When a cat is allowed to roam outdoors at night, serious consequences can result.

Of growing concern, is the increasing loss of our native biodiversity (small mammals, birds, lizards and frogs). Some of this loss is due to habitat destruction (such as removal of old hollow trees, understorey and groundcover disturbance). However, many of our smaller native animals are being significantly predated by our own pet cats and dogs and in some cases foxes.

You can protect your cat, preserve our native animals and minimise disruption to the community by ensuring that your cat is confined to your property and indoors between dawn and dusk.

Failing to register animals can result in costly penalties exceeding \$500.

Discount rates apply for pets that are desexed, micro chipped, registered with an approved association (the VCA or equivalent) or are over 10 years of age. The discount registration fee for a cat is \$30. Pensioners can receive a further 50 per cent concession on animal registration fees.
