I read this quote the other day. Today I went out to check when the cockatoos that are attracted in droves to the horse paddocks next door started their usual morning wheeling and screeching, and there sure enough was our eagle. I say he's ours but he really he's his own bird. There is a huge nest not far from here. He and his partner roam as far as the Tallarook Range and the Light Horse Park is a regular part of their beat. While rabbits must form a large part of their diet at the moment, I think Cockatoos are also high on the menu. They will also catch goannas.

This place used to be known for its goanna, I've been told. The nearest goannas I know of now are at Hughes Creek, and the Mangalore Flora Reserve. Their part of the chain is that the eggs of cockatoos used to be a major source of their diet. I try to leave hollow logs on the ground in the faint hope I am providing habitat for them and other reptiles. Sugar gliders, phascogales and antechinus also need hollows and will use fallen trees with hollows if nothing else can be found.

There used to be Curlews around here, I heard one myself ten or fifteen years ago, but none lately. They need short grass, fallen timber to hide in, and above all good fox control.

It is a wonderful thing that these animals still inhabit our part of the world, and we can leave little pockets of habitat for them to hang on in, into the future, and assist them by controlling the foxes.

BITS OF BOTANY AND BIRDS

Native raspberry Rubus parvifolius

If you spot a small scrawny blackberry plant, check carefully before destroying – it could be a native raspberry plant. This indigenous member of the berry family is fairly common in undergrowth in the Highlands district. It is smaller and with paler leaves than the introduced species. It has small pink flowers in spring and tiny red edible berries in summer.

HOW THE COMPOSTING & WORM FARM SUBSIDY WORKS

As part of the Sustainable Communities Program, Mitchell and Strathbogie Shire Councils are offering residents up to 50% subsidy on compost bins and worm farms purchased from May 1 to June 11, 2010. This subsidy provides an opportunity to become part of the wonderful world of composting or to learn about a new kind of small-scale farming – worm farming! Household waste in landfill emits powerful greenhouse gasses, especially methane. On a national level each year Australians generate 8.4 million tonnes a year in organic materials most of which could easily be composted. If every resident recycled their kitchen scraps and garden waste, the amount of material going to local refuse sites would reduce by a massive 46% by volume. It doesn't make sense to buy food just to throw it away in the bin, or fill up the rubbish bin with garden cuttings. Here is your chance to put a valuable resource to good use at a very low cost. Adding compost to your garden encourages strong plant growth and helps the soil retain water. Meanwhile, the worms are working tirelessly, turning your fruit and vegetable scraps into a marvelously rich soil conditioner. The by product of worm farms, known as 'worm tea,' and the worm castings are an excellent natural fertilizer. The participating retailers are Seymour Timber & Hardware, Broadford Timber & Hardware, Kilmore Mitre 10, Kilmore Home Timber & Hardware, Silkie Gardens Kilmore (Bokashi Bins) Wyndywood Worm Farm Kilmore (worm farms only), WB Hunter Euroa, True Value Hardware Euroa, Saville's Plumbing & Hardware Euroa and Violet Town Rural & Hardware. The Compost Bin and Worm Farm Subsidy will run for 6 weeks from May 1 or until vouchers have sold out. A voucher is required and will be available from the Mitchell and Strathbogie Shire websites, municipal libraries, customer service centres and from participating retailers. There is a limit of one compost bin or worm farm per household and actual worms are not covered by the subsidy. Purchase your compost bin or worm farm, have the voucher stamped by the retailer and send the voucher within seven days, with receipt attached, attention to: Cathy Koning Sustainable Communities Coordinator c/- Mitchell Shire Council 113 High Street Broadford 3658. Research carried out by academics from Aberystwyth University has resulted in a discovery which could lead both to an improvement in milk and meat production and to a significant reduction in methane emissions from cattle and sheep.

The research team, led by Professor Jamie Newbold of Aberystwyth University, found that by adding sandalwood (or a sandalwood analogue) to animal feed the growth of pathogenic bacteria such as E.coli and Listeria in the rumen is reduced. As a consequence, energy which would otherwise be lost through the production of methane is diverted to increased milk and meat production. At the same time there was a significant reduction in the emission of methane, a greenhouse gas with 23 times the global warming potential of the equivalent amount of carbon dioxide. It is estimated that livestock produce 18% of all global greenhouse gas emissions, more than all forms of transport combined.

Trials in a rumen simulating fermenter (Rusitec) confirmed that Javanol, a sandalwood analogue, reduced methane production by up to 25%. A reduction of 20% in methane emissions was achieved in field trials with sheep when 2ml of Javanol per day was added to their diet.

This is an exciting discovery in two ways," said Dr Ahmed Ali. "Firstly, there would be benefits to the agricultural industry through increased milk and meat production: this increase in productivity would be set against a background of growing pressures on global food supply. Secondly, there could be a significant reduction in methane emissions."

"Overall, the project is a good example of a University and an SME collaborating on cutting edge research. If this project and projects like this, can be commercialised in global markets, that has to be the way forward for the knowledge economy of Wales." Thanks to Susan Sleigh for sending this article.
