After completing his secondary schooling at Euroa Secondary College and Scotch College he commenced studying a combined Engineering/Commerce degree at Melbourne University where he was a resident at Trinity College.

After completing his degrees with First class honours he commenced a Masters in Engineering. However, in 1994 Ant deferred his studies when he was awarded a Rotary International Scholarship which enabled him to study overseas for twelve months. He decided to attend Bristol University in the U.K where he chose to study Politics, Philosophy and Economics. He returned to Australia and completed his Masters in 1996.

COMMUNITIES FOR NATURE

Grants to support practical local action in the environment.

Applications are now open for a \$20 million Communities for Nature grants program.

Communities for Nature grants are for local community groups and organisations looking to improve their natural environment and conserve local biodiversity values. Activities that will be funded include biodiversity and habitat preservation, revegetation, cleaning up of waterways and control of pests and weeds

The program will run for four years, with \$4 million available in 2011.

NEW COMMUNITY LEADERSHIP PROGRAMME?

A series of community discussions during October is being supported by the Foundation for Rural & Regional Renewal to discuss this very topic and everyone is invited to join in the conversation. Do we want our own community leadership program? What benefits will it bring us? What are the needs we most need to address?

"Community leaders are the backbone of our not-for-profits, sporting clubs and business groups," says Kerry Anderson from the Loddon Murray Community Leadership Program. "In many different roles they volunteer their time; not for personal profit but simply for the reward of helping others and to make a positive difference to their community."

Far more powerful in the long term than the short leadership courses on offer, Kerry emphasizes that a community leadership program is led by the community for the community.

"Ten individual not-for-profits are currently operating programs across Victoria, to support and inspire existing and aspiring community leaders from all walks of life," explains Kerry. "Every program operates differently to meet their region's needs but essentially a group of participants meet approximately two days per month over a period of ten months."

With evidence gathered from over a decade, there has been demonstrated strengthening of community and industry groups and the creation of influential regional networks with ongoing benefits. "It is a truly life changing experience for so many people and their communities," says Kerry.

The first community discussion for the Murrindindi Shire will be held at the Kinglake Rebuilding Advisory Centre on Wednesday 19 October from 12 noon until 2.00pm with a light lunch provided.

Common heath - Epacris impressa

This is a spindly shrub to 1 metre tall with small sharp leaves and masses of bell flowers growing directly from the branches. The flowers are pink or white – in our district I've only seen white but driving down the Melba highway there is a lot of pink around Toolangi. It prefers moist soils and some tree cover. The ones on our block struggle because something (probably wallabies) eats them – I put wire around one and it's now a magnificent display of flowers. The pink form is Victoria's floral emblem.



BOOK REVIEW

Tamar - Mal Peet

Never judge a book by its cover...well I grabbed this one because it had a photo of a Lancaster bomber on the front, thought it might appeal and it certainly did. Set in the present 1995 -2005 in England and at the very end of the Second World War in Holland, it tells the story of Tamar, his operational name, who parachutes into occupied territory, falls in love with a Dutch girl and tries to unite the various resistance factions in his part of the country. Many years later he suggests to his son that his grand-daughter to be is called Tamar and it is left to her, as a teenager, to unravel the mystery of not only her grandfather's wartime secrets, but her own father's disappearance when she was five. A fascinating read that allows the reader to experience the 'famine winter' of 1944-45 and all its repercussions. By Pauline Roberts


