TRUST for NATURE

TRUST for NATURE was founded in 1972, as a non-bureaucratic organization, working with local communities to locate and/or buy outstanding conservation properties, and to issue permanent Conservation Covenants on significant areas of private land.

Decisions to permanently protect land need careful consideration of the special features of your property, and your own conservation goals. Landholders incur no costs when establishing a covenant. Some costs, such as fencing, may be provided through Government Grants.

62 ha of the Seymour Bushland Park, on the eastern outskirts of Seymour, 100 acres of Grassy Woodland at Gobur, and some at Creighton's Creek, part of Callan's Range on Hughes Creek, the Glentannar swamp (1 ha), and a property joining the Switzerland Range Flora Reserve are under T for N Covenants.

In the Highlands area, there are 6 covenants, protecting a total of 229 ha, and across the State there are 903 covenants, protecting 37,000 ha. Also, 60 properties, Statewide, have been bought through the Trust and given to the Crown as reserves.

In Highlands, and throughout much of the Hughes Creek Catchment, the spring soaks and bogs often have a great diversity of unusual plants, animals, insects, and micro-organisms.

Several rare plants have already been found, and it would be very exciting to find bandicoots again, as these were once quite common.

The current vegetation and hydrological surveys being undertaken by Arthur Rylah Institute and the University of Melbourne (initiated and funded by GBCMA) will certainly add a lot of basic knowledge to our understanding of these unique assets.

On Saturday 15th November at 11 am, the Mt Pleasant Reserve, at Alexandra, with a Trust for Nature Covenant, will be opened. BITS OF BOTANY AND BIRDS

The BLUE PINCUSHION (Brunonia australis) is one of our more common and beautiful wildflowers, particularly in woodland communities, and often on sandy or shallow soils. The terminal flowerhead is a collection of bright blue 5-petalled flowers, growing on a stem to 30cms from a rosette of greyish silky leaves. It flowers, often in colonies, in late spring. Recently, I was quite surprised to find exactly the same plant flowering in outback Western Australia.

Walking for good health

Physical activity does not have to be vigorous or done for long periods in order to improve your health. Any exercise will improve your fitness levels. Walking is a suitable physical activity for most people, and is generally a safe activity.

Benefits of regular walking

Increased cardiovascular and pulmonary (heart and lung) fitness Reduced risk of heart disease and stroke

Improved management of conditions such as hypertension (high blood pressure), high cholesterol, joint and muscular pain or stiffness, and diabetes

Stronger bones and improved balance Increased muscle strength and endurance

Reduced body fat. Sustained weight loss.

Increased overall sense of well-being. Walk for 30 minutes a day

To get the health benefits, walk for at least 30 minutes as briskly as you can most days of the week. 'Brisk' means that you can still talk but not sing, and you may be puffing slightly. Wear loose, comfortable clothing, and sensible shoes. Protect yourself from the sun with clothes, sunglasses, a hat and sun block.

Drink plenty of fluids before and after your walk. Take water with you on a long walk.

If you have a medical condition or any health concerns, check with your doctor before you start any type of physical activity program.


