BORES AREN'T BORING

"There is an issue in Old Highlands Rd that is causing residents concern, which I thought might interest the wider Highlands community / the Hughes Creek Collaborative.

Those of us in the proximity of Hoiles Orchard have received notification that the orchard owners are applying for a licence to sink a replacement bore to a depth of 100 - 150 metres for irrigating the commercial cherry orchard, as well as for stock and domestic (although I'm not aware of any residence there and I'm uncertain what stock they are running).

The application asks, and I quote, "Any person able to demonstrate that their interests will be affected by the issuing of this Works Licence (Bore Construction), including any intended groundwater use, is invited to make a submission setting out the nature of the impact within 14 days of receipt of this written notification. Submissions should be sent to Manager Diversions Licensing, Goulburn-Murray Water, PO Box 165, TATURA, VIC, 3616."

Because water tables are a shared resource that can service a geographically wide area, interfacing with surface water (i.e. creeks and rivers) and facilitating the flow and filtration of water, salts and minerals through the soil, and because of reduced recharge rates in our current dry conditions, I thought that residents in the wider area might have an opinion about the viability of the above application and may like to make a submission.

Please note: I'm not advocating any view, for or against; I simply want people to be aware that the application has been made so they can make a submission if they wish. Because of the limited submission period, if people do wish to make a submission, they should do so to the above address as soon as possible."

BITS OF BOTANY AND BIRDS

The NANKEEN KESTREL is a small raptor which hovers over grasslands and perches on dead trees, fence posts, etc. It is found all over Australia, but is becoming rarer everywhere. It feeds on house mice, grasshoppers and other insects, and is recognized by its small size and pale rufous back and wings. Imagine your mobile battery is very low. To activate, press the keys *3370# Your mobile will restart with this reserve and the instrument will show a 50% increase in battery. This reserve will get charged when you charge your mobile next time.

How to disable a STOLEN mobile phone?

To check your Mobile phone's serial number, key in the following digits on your phone: * # 0 6 #

A 15 digit code will appear on the screen. This number is unique to your handset. Write it down and keep it somewhere safe. When your phone get stolen, you can phone your service provider and give them this code. They will then be able to block your handset so even if the thief changes the SIM card, your phone will be totally useless. You probably won't get your phone back, but at least you know that whoever stole it can't use/sell it either.

RHYTHMS OF LITERARY LIFE ENCOURAGED AT FOUR MONTHS

FOUR-month-old children will receive a free DVD and supporting booklet as part of a Brumby Government drive to boost literacy and encourage parents to read to their children.

"Reading to a child stimulates the child to develop communication skills that will get them off to the best possible start in life," Mr Hardman said.

"Learning begins in the home and the Young Readers Program will give parents practical information about how to help children understand literacy skills from a young age."

"Seventy five per cent of brain development occurs between birth and three years old, with early experiences determining whether or not a strong foundation will develop for future learning, behaviour and health," Mr Hardman said.

The Young Readers Program is a partnership between the Brumby Government, the State Library of Victoria and the Municipal Association Victoria.

WEDGE TAILED EAGLE GRANT



FOX FACTS

Andrew Carter is a PhD student from Charles Sturt University who is studying the movement and behaviour of foxes in the Barmah/Picola/Nathalia area of the Goulburn Broken Catchment. Some of Andrews observations include:

There are two types of foxes, those with set, well defined territories and those without. Territorial foxes have territories of about 1000 acres (400 ha). Roaming foxes can have territories of more than 6300 acres (2500 ha) Recolonisation of empty territories may take as little as 1 week. During June-July (breeding season) males will take short excursions beyond their normal territory to seek mates. During the course of a night, foxes travelled an average of 10km (ranging from 5-16km). In late summer/early autumn, juvenile foxes (especially males) seek new territories. Most (95%) culverts (300mm diameter) were either being used by foxes or had been used in the past. Andrew conducted an experiment and selected 5 key sites, Roadsides, Creek lines, Bushland, Open Paddocks and Fence lines. At each site he placed 60 baits and monitored the bait uptake. Following are the results: Roadsides: 75% baits taken use farm tracks/roads on your property as baiting public roads is illegal. Creek lines; 68% baits taken (remember to place the bait at least 20m from a waterway) Bushland: 57% bait taken. Open Paddock: 38% baits taken Fence lines: 33% baits taken
