PEOPLE AND PLACES

LESLIE DALZIEL is something of an icon of Whiteheads Creek, although she indignantly denies it. She spent some of her childhood in Mt Isa, where she had great freedom to roam the countryside. This, and the influence of her zoologist mother, possibly established a passionate interest in animals and the environment. She originally thought of Science as a career, but changed to Arts when she discovered she had to dissect a cockroach in Zoology! Leslie met her future husband, John, while at Queensland University where he was studying Vet Science. Leslie's active interest in the environment began in the early '80s, when the trees in Tallarook St were being cut down. The Seymour Environment group was formed, with Dr Colin Officer and Leslie being among the original group of about 35. As amateurs, they surveyed every roadside in the Seymour Shire, but their results were not accepted. They got a grant to pay a professional, David Lawrie, to redo the survey. The environmental values were then available as a resource for the engineering dept of the Shire. This Environment Group ran out of steam eventually, and BEAM (Broadford Environment Action Movement) is now going

After the big floods in 1974, Jock Wallis started theWhiteheads creek Soil Conservation Group, with Bruce Radford, their focus being revegetation of hills and trying to solve salinity problems. This became the Whiteheads Creek Landcare, and Leslie has been involved for many years. Recently, a new executive was elected, with new energies and ideas.

The Seymour Bushland Park with Colin Officer as the instigator and Leslie as Secretary until recently, is now under a Trust for Nature covenant.

In 1996, a group of people including Colin Officer, Jock Wallis and Leslie, set about rescuing land on the edge of Seymour earmarked for development, and the Light Horse park is well established, again with Leslie as Secretary. She says it has consumed her life for the last 10 years.

. For 5 years, she was a librarian for ACF, and has received many awards and acknowledgements of her work,including the Hubert Miller trophy in 2005. She contributes to Birds Australia, VNPA, Wildlife Pres. Society, Greenpeace, Bush heritage etc. An inspiration to many!

BITS OF BOTANY AND BIRDS

MILKMAIDS - (Burchardia umbellata) This is a common native lily, flowering now. It has conspicuous white star-like flowers with red centres, borne at the end of long slender stalks. There are 2 grass like leaves. It can be grown from seed, and the flowers can be eaten. It looks rather like a large Early Nancy flower.

FOOD SAFETY OUTDOORS

The warm weather is here and so is the time for barbecues, picnics, and partying outdoors.

Food poisoning is a real risk when taking food outside the home. Taking food out of the fridge, freezer, pantry or clean kitchen for long periods of time can mean a greater risk of contamination.

Eating outdoors can increase the risks of food poisoning because:- bacteria grow more easily between 5°C and 60°C; facilities for cleaning and hand washing may be inadequate; clean water is not always available; and food can be exposed to contamination from insects, pests and animals.

High risk foods include meat, poultry, dairy products, eggs, smallgoods such as hams and salamis, seafood, cooked rice, cooked pasta, prepared salads (coleslaws, pasta salads, rice salads) and prepared fruit salads.

Place containers with raw meat or other high risk foods into separate leak -proof containers and then into a cooler. Use plenty of ice or cold packs around the food. Frozen drinks can serve as icepacks, especially in packed school lunches. Travel with the cooler on the floor of the car, out of sunlight. Cover cooler with a blanket for extra insulation. A MESSAGE FROM WALES RURAL TRADERS

Cattle - Pink Eye

We have a number of cattle producers successfully using the Piliguard (Pink Eye) vaccine. There is some planning involved to get the best results out of this 1 shot preventative injection, however the users have been very happy with the reduction/prevention of pink eye.

Cattle - Summer Drench

A quick reminder that a Summer Drench for cattle will be your most important and strategic treatment for worms & lice in cattle.

Should I treat my adult Cows? This would be the most frequently asked question that I get asked. While your adult cows will usually handle these burdens OK, assuming that they are in good condition (condition score 2.5 or more), and are not short of feed, it will come at some cost eg. reduced milk production. These cows will also contribute to the worm contamination on pastures, having a greater impact on the calves (which have little immunity to worms), hence the calves will have reduced growth rates and weaning weights. 
