PEOPLE AND PLACES

Following the recent elections for the Koriella Ward of the Murrindindi Shire, our new councillor is JOHN WALSH of Yarck. The Koriella Ward includes the Northern section of the Murrindindi Shire and extends from the junction of the King Parrot Creek and the Goulburn River in the west to part of Eildon National Park in the East, also Whanregarwen. Limestone and to Glenburn in the South. A huge area for one representative, but John has a great background of community involvement, and has already made himself well known and available to most areas.

John and his wife, Robyn, both grew up in the Dandenongs, and then John attended Duntroon Military College, serving as an Army Officer for 21 years. He and Robyn had 14 moves in 17 years, including postings to UK and Washington. Next, John spent 13 years at Ringwood, where he worked in Project Management in I.T.

However, a country lifestyle beckoned for both of them and they acquired 230 acres at Yarck, where they have run beef cattle and grown gooseberries commercially for 10 years. Robyn wanted a place to train racehorses, but settled for involvement in the local Race club.

Their son (with a PhD in Maths) lives in Minneappolis and has a career modelling volcanic eruptions and predicting them. Their daughter works as a Physiotherapist in Community Health in Melbourne.

John started a Yarck Community-Group ("The Yarck Yabbies") to raise money for local organizations. He is a CFA member, and also belongs to the Home Creek – Spring Creek Landcare. He started the Yarck Market to raise money for the Hall. It operates on the 3rd Saturday of each month, and continues in the winter, with Devonshire Teas provided by the CWA in the Hall. (Next date is 20th December)

John stood for Council because of "smoldering embers rather than burning desire" but is already throwing himself headlong into the job. He thinks consideration needs to be given to anomalies in the present rating system, where so-called "life-style blocks" and their current high values, have pushed up rates on broad-acre properties.

John will welcome contact from ratepayers and residents, and will try to address concerns.

IT'S WEED TIME AGAIN

If you are spraying blackberries, St John's Wort or any other weed on your property you may like to hire a Landcare spray unit for \$30 per day.

Landcare owns 5 spray units and they are kept at the following properties. Ring the person closest to you and book in a time that suits you.

Landcare also provides a 50% subsidy on chemicals for spraying weeds. This does not include bracken. If you wish to apply for the subsidy you need to contact our Landcare facilitator on 57969261. Miranda Yorston will visit your property to discuss the amount of

chemical needed for the job you plan to do this financial year. You then purchase the chemical and submit your receipt to Miranda, who passes it to the HCCC Landcare Treasurer for a 50% refund. Miranda is then required, as a condition of the government funding, to visit the property after the work has been completed. As you can see, the whole procedure has been tightened up to make us all more accountable for the money being provided through government funds.

BITS OF BOTANY AND BIRDS

The EASTERN SPINEBILL is a common and well known small Honey eater, with a long, fine and down-curved bill. It has a white throat, black head, buff front and dark grey wings and lower back. It feeds on insects as well as nectar, and its nest is a small cup of twigs, grass and bark, combined with hair and spiders web. It sometimes hovers like a humming bird when feeding on flower nectar.

RESPONSIBILITIES

- 1. Be at the shed by 09:30 unless arranged otherwise with your partner
- 2. Check oil, tyres etc
- 3. Drive truck for at least 30 km
- 4. Run pump motor for at least 5 mins
- 5. Check equipment in storage lockers
- 6. Fill in log book at completion
- 7. REMOVE KEY from ignition upon parking truck
- 8. Report any problems to the captain or a lieutenant

Now is the time landholders should be in the process of controlling blackberries on their properties as the plants are actively growing and susceptible to herbicides


Re-inspections for around 40 properties will be undertaken at the beginning of January 2009. DPI extension officers will be in contact to arrange necessary inspections.
