BITS OF BOTANY AND BIRDS

RICHARD'S PIPIT is a pale brown "ground lark" which wags its longish white-edged tail up and down, and runs rapidly along open or shrubby ground before taking to the air. It is found all over Australia, and builds a cup nest of grass in the shelter of tussocks and rocks. It has an elaborate courting ritual in the air, accompanied by a sweet trilling song. It should not be confused with the similar Singing Bushlark and Common Skylark, both of which are found in this area.

Worms not stopping for Holidays! A Message from Wales Rural traders

With a wetter than usual November/ December period, all of our valued clients are encouraged to remain vigilant with their parasite control. A combination of higher worm egg counts, and a warm/wet summer period could lead to disastrously high worm burdens during the Autumn/Winter period. We are already getting feedback about egg counts creeping into the 200 & 300 range, which will be impacting on production, but much more importantly, laying down significant burdens on the pastures which are being assisted by the higher than usual moisture levels. Our recommendation to sheep producer's, is that you conduct Faecal Egg Counts (FEC's) from NOW, and consistently test every 2-3 weeks in an attempt to detect early rises in Egg count so that you can contain pasture contamination, and minimize production losses.

We have worm test kits (from Parasite Diagnostics) available at the store. These are invoiced at the store and we will assist you in the interpretation of the results and/or fine tuning your summer drench program.

Bites and Stings

Australia has many animals and insects that bite or sting. In general, first aid includes bandaging the wound and keeping the person immobile until medical help arrives. Keep the person calm. Don't tourniquet, cut or suck the wound. Don't give the affected person alcohol to drink.

Seek immediate medical help and call triple zero (000) for an ambulance in an emergency. If the person collapses or stops breathing, apply CPR until medical help arrives.

If you can – and it's safe to do so – capture the animal or insect for identification purposes.

Bees – remove the sting by sliding or scraping your fingernail across it, rather than pulling it. Wash the area and apply ice to reduce swelling. If the person has an allergy to beestings, immobilise them, apply pressure to the bite and seek immediate medical help.

Funnel web spider – seek immediate medical help. Bandage the wound firmly. Use a second bandage to wrap the arm or leg and splint the affected limb. Antivenom is required. Red-back spider – wash the affected area well and soothe the pain with icepacks or iced water. Don't bandage the area.

Snakes - seek immediate medical help. . Don't wash the skin, as traces of venom might be needed to identify the snake. Bandage and splint the limb. If bitten on the torso, check the bandaging doesn't restrict breathing. Tick – if a tick has burrowed into the skin, gently pull it out with fine tweezers, making sure you remove the entire body. After removal of the tick, wash the site with warm soapy water and then a mild antiseptic. Cover the site with a 'band-aid' for 24 hours. European wasps – clean the affected area with soap and warm water. Use an icepack to reduce swelling and pain. Use pain-relieving medication and creams. Watch for signs of allergic reaction.
