PEOPLE AND PLACES

Some Recollections of Fires in the Highlands Area.

A changing population over the years means there are few of us left to remember early fires. An enormous blaze raced through in the late 1800s, from well N of Dropmore to the Goulburn River and back on the S wind through Highlands.

Steve McAlpin recalls his father saying the fires were not nearly as bad in the 1920s, because the rabbits had eaten everything. In those days, a mixture of phosphorus and pollard was spread as a rabbit poison. This tended to ignite spontaneously, and was a major cause of fire. Ken Yorston (the late Peter Yorston's father) and Doug Lade's father, Neill, would gallop on horses at the first sign of smoke and beat out flames with green branches. There were no fire restrictions and no Fire Brigades. The late Ewen Waddell, of Caveat, called a meeting to form the first local Brigade, Grandpa Neill lade becoming the first Captain, Furphy tanks were pulled by horses and later by motor vehicles.

In January 1965, the huge Longwood fire (which killed 5 children and 2 adults trying to flee in a car), burnt through Tarcombe and Bungle Boori to Fernside and Granite Hills. Again, the S wind sent it back across the unburnt part of Bungle Boori and Mt Helen at Habbies Howe. Bill and Libby Webb were holidaying at Portland with their 4 children, they drove back in the middle of the night. Libby remembers mustering stock with Bill, and Dick Webb, not many were lost. Doug and I, and our 5 children, were in a swimming pool at Murrindindi. S of Yea. when burnt bracken actually landed beside us! Not a sound from any child as we drove up the Ghin Ghin Cutting, with the N sky a smoky orange cloud. An urgent phone call came to say a spot fire had reached Granite hills then the S change came.

9th January 1969 – another shocking day – screaming wind and high temps – a fire started near Ghin Ghin, another at Junction Hill, W of Yea. This burnt to Alexandra on NW wind, with shocking losses of stock and property. The S change brought it to the top of the Switzerland Range at 4 pm where the Army was mobilized with a bull-dozed break and many troops.

The Highlands Hall became a Red Cross Post where we produced 100s of meals for a week. The Euroa Red Cross arrived with supplies (including much needed toilet paper!) and an enormous pot of beautiful stew – we had to heat it on camping stoves and dish it up on saucers with teaspoons – no power or telephones. Later, we equipped the hall with 2nd hand stuff, and got ourselves well-organized (and haven't needed it for 40 years). What a different set-up at the Hall now!

On this Black Saturday (7Feb) with 46 degrees at Highlands, and the vicious wind, a branch was blown on the Power line at Steve McAlpin's, the wire landed on a fence and by some miracle, there were no sparks, the fuses at the Hall were tripped and we are all still here, and very proud and thankful for our wonderful community over many years.

HPS Student of the Week


Alex Horne, for a great job of settling into school. Well done!

LUNCH BOX TIPS

Healthy lunches and snacks are important for active children. Eating healthy food helps children concentrate and learn. Healthy eating changes are not always easy to make - set a good example with your own eating habits. Encourage children to be involved in preparing their own lunch and choosing the foods to include. Choose a variety of food from all food groups:

Fruit - choose fresh or tinned fruit. Dried fruit is sticky and high in sugar, so have it occasionally. Best left out of the lunch box are dried fruit bars and 'straps', which are very high in sugar, low in fibre and stick to children's teeth.

BITS OF BOTANY AND BIRDS

CARE for BIRDS in the GARDEN.
1- CLEAN WATER, if you are prepared to maintain the supply in dry times. Shallow containers on low pedestals are best. Put a flat rock in the middle to provide a take-off point. Situate near shrubs so the birds have somewhere to feel safe e.g. from cats. Perching spots on trees and shrubs nearby are encouraging.

2- I have 3 or 4 small unglazed terracotta bowls handing around the garden, again with perching spots near, I fill them once a day using 1/2 cup sugar to 1 litre water. So simple and so rewarding. I don't want to make the birds dependent on me,(but sometimes I cheat, and add extra at lunchtime!!)

'Aviculture in Australia', Shephard. M (Black Cockatoo Press 1989)


His work can be found in private collections throughout Australia and internationally.
