OVARIAN CANCER

February is Ovarian Cancer Awareness Month. Can you name any symptom of ovarian cancer? If you can't, you're not alone. A National Breast and Ovarian Cancer Centre survey has shown that one in five Australian women can't name one symptom of ovarian cancer. The survey of over 2000 women revealed over 60 per cent of Australian women still believe an abnormal Pap test is a sign of ovarian cancer. A Pap test is designed to detect cancer of the cervix, not ovaries

Each year in Australia about 1500 women are diagnosed with ovarian cancer and more than half of these women will not survive five years after their diagnosis. More than 70 per cent of women are diagnosed at an advanced stage, where the cancer has spread and is difficult to treat successfully. Detected in its earliest stages ovarian cancer is 90% curable. The risk of ovarian cancer increases with age.

Symptoms include persistent and unusual: abdominal bloating; indigestion or heartburn; loss of appetite or feeling full; changes in toilet habits; unexplained weight gain or loss; fatigue; and abdominal or back pain. There is no reliable early detection test or screening program for ovarian cancer and the cause is not known. Diagnosis involves a range of tests including blood tests and ultrasound. See your doctor promptly if you have had any of the above symptoms for more than two weeks and those symptoms are unusual for you.
