#### **SIMPLY SHARING**

Many readers will already know Leah Jones from attending her workshops, visiting The spirit house Gallery, or more recently, the Naturally Made Store in Binney Street, Euroa, and of late, her International Women's Day lunches have become a ritual. Leah always brings together a lively bunch of women and this year Anne Brown from Seymour talked to us about how she came to set up The Simply Sharing Organisation.

Anne comes from a family of adventurous travellers and last year, partly as the result of planning, she found herself at Bhaktivdanta Vidya Mandir Primary School in West Bengal, India.

The pupils who attend the school, came from poor farming villages near Mayapur on the Ganges and the school is funded by a secular Indian NGO, and Anne was shocked to find that her students, often as young as three years old, were sent to school each day with only a small tin of puffed rice to eat.

When Anne's investigations led her to the Hari Krishna Iskcon nearby who would be able to provide a nourishing meal to the children for one dollar a day, therefore it only costs \$40 to provide a child with a meal on every school day for a whole year, and knowing that their children would receive a good meal would encourage parents to keep sending their children to school.

Already, Simply Sharing has raised enough money to feed all the students in the school for the whole of term one, and now Anne is working with a team to feed the school for the rest of the year.

Amongst the great strengths of this project are Anne's commitment and energy, and her determination to make every dollar donated go directly into real meals. At a time when we all feel stretched it was good to look beyond our own borders.

#### FESTIVAL AND RAIN BRING LIFF BACK TO THE BUSH

"Busker John Bennett, 8, an enthusiastic talent with the ukulele and guitar, works through his song list for an appreciative audience at the Yea festival.

Many performers came courtesy of the Melbourne International Arts Festival, including some big-name bands such as Spiderbait and Little Red.

A much smaller name in the entertainment world is John Bennett, but what he lacks in size, age and recognition he makes up for in enthusiasm. His parents are winemakers from the hill town of Caveat, in the Strathbogies, and his mother, Susan Bennett, said he had been playing since he was four, mostly hit tunes from the '60s to '80s.

At yesterday's festival a busload was brought in from Kinglake and the nearby towns of Flowerdale and Glenburn. Bus-trip organiser Anne Leadbeater said it was nice for fire-affected people to come to Yea just to see a bit of greenery, though their own areas were already "starting to see a little bit of green. The Australian bush is very resilient; and so are our communities."

As for Yea, like many towns in fireravaged areas, it has been doing it tough. One of the festival organisers, Sandra Hanley, said the fires had made many shopkeepers realise how reliant they now were on tourism. Kim Chadband was helping out in the Marmalade Cafe. "There was an 80pc drop after the fires, but today it is so busy we are struggling to cope!"

#### FISH RESCUE

Water Levels in the Hughes Creek reached critical levels fish survival for 3 weeks ago . The creek below Bungle Boori stopped flowing. This is where the Macquarie perch live . Fern Hames, Native Fish Coordinator from DSE was notified and came out to survey the fish last Friday . She found the fish in a stressed condition and in poor health but no dead fish were discovered. No flow of water into the deeper pools where the perch had retreated resulted very low oxygen levels in the water and increased water temperatures . The survival of these fish is very important . The Hughes Creek is one of only 3 sites in the Goulburn Broken where maccas are found . The Hollands Creek , which stopped flowing 3months ago and the King Parrot creek where they were moved from the week before because of the threat of ash and silt inflows after the bushfires.

An emergency decision was made to remove 10% of our perch , (32 fish) to a special pond at Snobs Creek Fishery near Eildon . The health of these fish quickly picked up with improved oxygen , a decent feed and treatment for parasites . These fish will be kept at Snobs Creek to ensure the gene pool survives and to restock Hughes Creek if needed in the future when water levels return to reasonable levels .

I would like to thank Fern and her team for their dedication to the welfare of our native fish.


#### **TERIP TERIP TENNIS**


