FIRE AFFECTED WATER-WAYS UNDER THE MICROSCOPE

A detailed evaluation of major waterways affected by the major wild fires in the upper Goulburn River catchment is to be undertaken to allow authorities to respond and plan for short and long term recovery programs.

Bushfires devastated a major part of the Upper Goulburn Catchment.

A number of streams will be the focus of the assessment including parts of the Big River, Acheron, Rubicon, Steavensons and Taggerty rivers, Yea and Murrindindi rivers, King Parrot

Creek and the Sunday Creek catchment.

Goulburn Broken CMA Manager of Strategic River Health, Wayne Tennant, said: "Some of the data to be collected will include location quantity and location of large wood, where these pose a threat to waterway stability and public infrastructure, damage to cultural / heritage sites, evidence of in stream river management works, availability of habitat refuges and water supply points."

This information is vital to plan for emergency programs, as well as long term river recovery projects.

Mr Tennant said GBCMA was working with partner agencies – Goulburn-Murray Water, Goulburn Valley Water, Department of Sustainability and Environment (DSE), Department of Primary Industries and the Environmental Protection Authority – to plan for the waterway recovery initiative.

"To compliment this review agencies are setting up water quality monitoring sites to provide early notice of poor water quality events.

The community is encouraged to report major damage or problems along the waterways or water quality changes to the Goulburn Broken CMA at its Yea office 57 360100


SAFE AND SOUND

Longwood / Ruffy Blackberry

Project. Department of Primary Industry

Due to the recent emergency response and recovery operations associated with the bushfires this project has been postponed. The DPI plan to continue with all Compliance Notices already issued, however no new inspections will be conducted this season. Inspections will recommence in November 2009.

REPS Rabbit Program

Department of Primary Industry Warning -Rabbit numbers are building up again-act now to control them . Bait now ,Fumigate after rain .

The aim for the 2009/2010 season in Ruffy and Highlands will be to complete inspections in the Kobyboyn area then move along the Ponkeen Creek Road from Tarcombe to the Ardroy Corner The Longwood East Program will move into the Gap road Area . The Creightons Creek / Gooram program will focus on the Killeens Hill Road area.

Strathbogie Shire Roadside

Blackberry All remaining roadside blackberries in the Strathbogie Shire area of Ruffy were spot sprayed this week, this seems late in the season to be effectively killing blackberries but you will notice yellowing blackberry bushes along the Creightons Creek roadsides already. Andrew Wylie of Euroa was the contractor doing this work for the shire.

Sue Ablitt , Land Management Officer for Strathbogie Shire , coordinated the program. Landcare groups were consulted.


Dear Miranda,
