May 2nd marks the first anniversary of Cyclone Nargis in Myanmar. The overwhelming response to our own bushfire disaster increases the empathy I feel for the Burmese people who are still struggling to recover from the cyclone

Working with the orphaned children, and the extraordinary people who care for them, is a remarkable and life-changing experience. These people display resilience, determination and optimism which is inspiring.

Originally, I went to teach and to offer the skills I have to make their lives just a little richer but after every visit, I learn a little more about myself, about putting life's challenges into perspective and about the strength of the human spirit...and a few more words of Burmese!

As a board member of GraceWorks Myanmar, I am now able to offer this experience to others, whatever their skills or interests. It can be challenging and emotional but the rewards are immense. It will be possible to participate in any of the GraceWorks projects and visit some of the main tourist sites around Yangon.

# FIRST AID FOR MENTAL HEALTH

First Aid is the help given to an ill or injured person before medical treatment can be obtained. The aims of first aid are to preserve life, prevent deterioration of the condition, and provide comfort to the ill or injured person.

Mental Health First Aid is the help provided to a person developing a mental health problem or in a mental health crisis. Like regular first aid, the aims are to preserve life (where the person is a danger to themselves of others), to prevent the problem becoming more serious, and provide comfort. Mental Health First Aid teaches how to recognise the symptoms of mental health problems, how to provide initial help, and how to go about guiding a person to appropriate professional help.

There is a stigma associated with mental health problems, and many people are not well informed. This results in many people not getting the help they need. One in five adults will experience a mental health problem at some time in their life, so most of us will be touched by mental health issues either directly or indirectly.

Do you know what to do if someone if having a panic attack? Hearing voices? Suicidal? Irrational? Aggressive? Mental Health First Aid training could help you manage such situations.

The Mental Health First Aid course is available locally. A course is running in Yea in April. If you are interested in knowing more about mental health problems and being better equipped to manage mental health situations, contact the course instructor Margaret McLauchlan at Community Health (numbers below) or on mobile 0419 538 589.

Courses can be run anywhere in the Murrindindi Shire (or beyond) if there is enough interest.

# LOCAL CONSTRACTORS OUR PRIORITY SAYS COUNCIL

As the cleanup continues throughout the fire affected areas of the Murrind-indi Shire, local contractors are being used wherever possible says Mark Leitinger head of the Council's Murrindindi Construction team.

Since the emergency, council has engaged over 120 contract staff and their equipment to help in particular with roadside tree safety works.

Says Mark "The scale of the work required in tree safety alone is massive and has required resourcing at significantly greater than normal levels. I estimate that over \$5 million will be needed to satisfactorily complete the cleanup.

Roadside tree crews are assisted by highly qualified tree experts and the extra resources have come from local contractors to support these crews. Eight firms located within the shire have been involved so far but many more are expected to be engaged to assist with such things as road works, drains and shoulder restoration.

"The types of equipment we'll be needing include excavators, trucks, graders, guidepost and sign installation as well as guardrail erection."

"The Murrindindi Shire Council is committed to supporting the local community and as a priority we will be looking to support local contractors wherever possible."
