Meagan has been the head teacher at Highlands Primary for the past 12 months .She was brought up in Yea, and attended kindergarten. Primary and Secondary schools there. She has one brother who runs the Yea Post Office. Meagan moved to Melbourne where she did Teacher Training at the Burwood Campus of Deakin University. Her first job involved emergency teaching in Yea, then to Kinglake West, and then back to Yea for about 15 years. Meagan believes that a small school suits some kids more than a bigger, town-based school and the varied community support here helps broaden the children's horizons.

She often talks about "Life-Long Learning" and how important these early years are. Certainly, at Highlands, the children are given every opportunity to develop many skills and personalities. There are many excursions and recently the Juniors went to a 4 day camp at Rubicon and the Seniors had a packed few days at Bendigo.

The school is one of the hubs of the Community so aren't we lucky to have Meagan as Principal, as well as the other dedicated staff and volunteers.

Bushfire At-Risk Register

The Department of Education and Early Childhood Development have released a Bushfire At-Risk Register of all schools that are considered to be at high risk of fire danger. Highlands Primary School has been placed on that list and that means when the Bureau of Metrology issues a Code Red Fire Danger Rating warning for our weather district the school will be closed. The bus will not run on these days either. Where possible the DEECD will provide up to 3 days notice of the planned closure. The final decision to close the school will be confirmed no later than 12 noon the day before the planned closure. All maps are draft unless otherwise listed. As TPPs are approved by councils and Neighbourhood Safer Places are designated over time, the maps will be amended to final versions.

SCHOOLS SAVE OVER 200,000 PLASTIC BAGS FROM LANDFILL

In total, 229,712 plastic bags were rounded up as part of the Coles Plastic Bag Challenge. Amazingly, 93% of these were collected by schools! Well done! The winning school, St Paul Apostle North Primary (VIC), collected 9,778 bags - Narrowly pipping Ben Venue Public School (Armidale, NSW) and Smithton Primary School (TAS), who also had over 9,000 bags! The individual winner was 8 year old Tyler Richardson of Ravenswood, Tasmania, with 1,455 bags.

BITS OF BOTANY AND BIRDS

CHOCOLATE LILY- (Arthropodium

strictum) is flowering now in some profusion on roadsides and in the bush. It grows to about 1 m. tall, as a tufted, chocolate-scented perennial. The flowers are solitary in bract axils and are deep pink or mauve. The root tubers are up to 2 cms long.



MURRINDINDI SHIRE COUNCIL PREPARING FOR FIRE SEASON

As part of it's fire prevention strategies, Murrindindi Shire Council has been playing its part in helping everyone prepare and plan for the coming 2009/2010 bushfire season.

co-ordinated a mail out to all absentee land owners this season to alert them of the need to prepare for this fire season.

carrying out annual property inspections across the shire to identify fire hazards. Where work is needed to reduce the risk of fire, notices are issued to land owners with stringent timelines for any required work to be carried out.

Failure to comply with a 'fire notice' will see Council completing the works at the land owner's expense.

Residents with concerns over neighbouring properties are encouraged to contact council, to ensure any potential hazards are inspected as quickly as possible.

OUR GROUNDWATER THAT GOES INTO BOTTLED WATER!

Never mind the North South pipeline, what about the litres of water that have been and continues to be extracted from the Highlands/Caveat groundwater and used for bottled water.

It is clear from anecdotal evidence from land owners around the district that creeks have less volume than 10 years ago, some springs have dried up and bores need to go deeper. Rainfall records taken over the last 10 to 15 years also indicate that the average annual rainfall in this area has fallen. Already this year, unless we received a much higher than average rainfall in the next few months, we could be facing yet another dry year. We also know that some landowners already have to buy in water during the summer months. The signs of less available water are all about us, as we watch mature trees suddenly die in the forest and by the roadside.

This district in the past, so well endowed with good rainfall and available ground and surface water, is now facing a serious water problem. A situation that is liable to get worse rather than better.

Despite all this around 80,000 litres (varying according to seasonal demand) of groundwater is extracted from the Caveat bore every week and transported to a distant factory and turned into bottled water under the brand 'Split Rock'.

The Highlands/Caveat groundwater is being exploited for the sake of a commercial fad, not to mention the environmental tragedy created by the plastic bottles.

What we can do about this as a community?

The owners of the property and the bore pay appropriately for the water rights and it is true that theirs is a legitimate commercial enterprise. The question is whether it is a moral enterprise given the pressure it places on the district's groundwater in a time of reducing water availability. In our day and age is it right that one person or company has the right to exploit resources to the detriment of legitimate and basic community needs. Many would claim with good reason that bottled water is unnecessary and wasteful of resources.
