THOUGHTS ON WRITING POETRY PART ONE

'Writing is an act of survival' wrote American poet Adrienne Rich

When I was asked to talk to Euroa Rotary Club about The Healing Power of Poetry, I was, I'll admit, challenged. As I often do, I went looking for quotes as starting points.

'Telling our stories transforms our lives' writes Louise De Salvo's in Journal Writing as a Way of Healing. de Salvo sets out some very specific guidelines about how to use writing as a way of healing, or re-ordering one's life.

"Give sorrow words" –wrote Shakespeare, but writing is not a magic cure.

'What is healing but a shift in perspective?' wrote Mark Doty.

But then, when we sit down, full of good intentions, to write, or to read, we can't always find the right words.

My faith in the power of writing, and reading does not rely on quotes but rather on real life examples:

First—The farmer who joined a writing class to learn some writing skills so she could contribute to her church magazine. She found her way through a dry February, discovering Shakespeare's Sonnets. 'they rhyme' she said 'and they follow a pattern.'

They successfully distracted her from her daily worries and inspired her to write her own thoughts, in her own way.

Secondly, I will never forget my neighbour in the Wimmera, who spent his last years looking out on the red gums that surrounded his house of many years, reading from a pile of poetry books on the table beside his chair. I'm sure we have some quiet writers and readers tucked away in our hills.

"Two or three things I know, two or three things I know for sure, and one of them is that to go on living I have to tell stories, that stories are one sure way I know how to touch the heart and change the world." Dorothy Allison

SEYMOUR BUSHLAND PARK

The Seymour Bushland Park Committee of Management is in its 30th year and is looking for enthusiastic members with a desire to protect this valuable habitat, and to make it accessible to the community. The Annual General Meeting offers a chance to become involved.

The park is an ever changing kaleidoscope of birds, with Yellow Robins, Flame Robins and Scarlet Robins, Brown Tree Creepers, and of course Eastern and Crimson Rosellas. In addition, endangered and rare species such as the beautiful Red Capped Robin, Speckled Warbler and Diamond Firetailed Finches can be seen there. Animals such as Sugar Gliders, Brush tailed Phascogales and tiny Antechinus, as well as Wombats, Koalas and Echidnas call the park home. In Spring a gorgeous display of wildflowers emerges from the dry surrounds. The Committee conducts a Spring Wildflower walk each year.

The Park has many important values and is a dynamic example of natural regeneration from a bare paddock, and a useful educational tool to Landcarers. It forms a significant block of Box-Ironbark Vegetation, all the more valuable because of its links to the North-South corridor that is Telegraph-Lambing Gully Road.

Because of its significant environmental values, Mitchell Shire has covenanted the Park in conjunction with Trust for Nature, to be preserved for all time.

BITS OF BOTANY AND BIRDS

Mistletoe bird

(Dicaeum hirundinaceum)

In spite of its bright colouring this bird is seldom noticed, because it is so tiny and is normally deep in foliage. The male has a bright red chest, white belly with a black strip down the middle and a shiny blue-black back. As is often the case with colourful birds, the female is dull brown! Their main food is mistletoe berries and they are the chief spreader of that plant. They have an unusually short and simple digestive tract, so the seeds pass through them and are deposited on a new plant in between 10 to 30 minutes. They also eat other berries and insects.

THE RABBIT- A SUPERB BREEDING MACHINE

With the bumper spring season looming, the decline in the myxo and calicivirus impacts and the cost of 1080 baits, rabbit numbers are on the rise.

In the early 1980's when " ...the hills were alive with signs of rabbits..." (apologies to the Sound of Music). Not that many landholders nowdays can recall the devastation that rabbits caused then - bare paddocks, invasive weeds like Patto, soil loss and erosion, young trees ringbarked, damaged horses and vehicles (and twisted ankles). Some landholders in the Strathbogies resorted to carting cement and water by hand in order to concrete holes in the granite rocks. In the late 1800's South Australian farmers walked off their land because of rabbits accentuating the impact of dry years. In 1952, iust two years after the introduction of myxo, the value of the increased wool and meat production was estimated at \$70m (or \$500m in today's dollars). The cost of rabbits just to the Victorian economy in 1998 was estimated to be \$360m (or over \$500m in today's dol-

Eight rabbits eat the feed of one sheep. That could mean a loss of \$10-\$12 per rabbit at today's lamb prices. The all-up cost of 1080 baiting, even at today's substantially increased bait costs, is 5-10 cents per rabbit depending on rabbit numbers and the effectiveness of the baiting program.

The rabbit's breeding capacity is quite formidable. Under good conditions, such as we have now, a doe can become pregnant at 12-16 weeks and give birth in another 4 weeks. An average litter is 5-6 kittens and a doe will mate again within hours of giving birth. She can have 5-7 litters per season. A doe and her female offspring can produce over 100 rabbits in a single season. Thanks to the Burnt Creek Landcare Group for this article.

SEASONAL REMINDERS: LAST CHANCE ON PATTO

A bumper year for Patto is upon us and spraying must be done before the stems elongate, flower and run to seed (presuming it stops raining long enough to get on the paddocks).

Even so much more spray will be needed than if it were done in autumn when the plants were at the small rosette stage. The drought years have meant that a lot of seed was spread by wind blown soil and now its spread by water runoff.

Patto, like rabbits, is a sleeper issue as far as funding incentives are concerned - we used to have 50% of herbicide costs and up to \$60/ha for pasture establishment as incentives. Funds are now directed to "new and emerging weeds" and Patto is obviously not in this category.


