PEOPLE AND PLACES

With this perfect weather for growth, come the exotic weeds. We all need to be vigilant in taking action to identify and eradicate noxious weeds across the shire.

Paterson's Curse: While it looks beautiful as a mass of purple flowers across the hill tops in spring and early summer, Paterson's Curse is a noxious weed that is poisonous to grazing animals and reduces pasture productivity.

In particular we can all be on the lookout for individual plants that appear along the roadside stop and remove them for everyone's benefit.

Chilean needle grass: One of Australia's worst noxious weeds, Chilean needle grass has been identified in the Cheviot Ward.

This is a weed of national significance and I would urge landholders to be on the lookout for the weed and take immediate action to have it removed.

Chilean needle grass is similar in appearance to the native spear grasses. It can be identified by the corona at the join of the seed body and the awn. It also has a distinctive tuft of hairs at the junction of the leaf blade and the leaf sheath. Our native spear grasses lack these features.

Chilean needle grass can severely reduce pasture productivity, contaminate crops and hay and its needle like seeds can injure stock or pets. Seeds can burrow into fleece and skin of sheep and cause wool and carcass downgrading. If you find either of these weeds on your property or on a roadside please contact Sue McNair at Murrindindi Shire Council on 5772 0333. This will help to map known areas of infestation and we can work towards containment and ultimately eradication of this emerging weed. WILDLIFE HANDLING TIPS

Stress is a major killer of injured animals and birds so keep handling and disturbance to a minimum. A quiet animal is an animal in shock. Approach the animal quietly (no talking) and carefully cover it with a towel or blanket to calm it and contain it. If it is small enough place it in a pillowcase or on a towel in the bottom of a well ventilated box and cover securely. Birds should never be placed in a cage. Place box in a warm, dark and quiet area (no radio).

Keep domestic animals and children well away.

Do not attempt to feed or force it to drink.

Wildlife need specialist care and attention and without this will deteriorate very quickly, so for the sake of the animal get it to a licensed wildlife carer or vet ASAP. Please remember that all native wildlife is protected by law and a Government permit is required to hold any wildlife. You must be authorized by the DSE as a wildlife shelter operator or be a registered foster carer to keep native wildlife in care in Victoria. If it is a larger animal or you are unsure, call for help. If possible remain with the animal until help arrives, staying at a safe distance so as not to distress it further. If you cannot remain with the animal note distinct landmarks and mark the location with crossed sticks plastic bags tied to a tree (or in some other readily identifiable fashion) so the rescuer can find it easily.

If the animal is dead, check it for a pouch to see if it has a young joey still alive. Never pull a joey from a teat, but rather cut the teat, or leave in pouch for the rescuer to remove. Pouch joeys are very fragile, so handle carefully, place into a pillowcase and keep warm, dark and quiet. Also check the surrounding area for young that may be hiding nearby. A koala may have had a joey on her back. A kangaroo or wallaby may 'throw' a joey from her pouch when injured.

Finally, keep a rescue kit in your car containing towel, pillowcase, blanket and scissors.

BITS OF BOTANY AND BIRDS

Native Violets

There are two common species of native violet found around Highlands and both are in flower at the moment. Viola hederacea (ivy-leafed or native violet) has small flowers with a purple centre but white outer, and circular leaves. Viola betonicifolia (showy or mountain violet) has larger, all purple flowers and longer pointed leaves, more like a garden violet. Both grow mainly in shaded forest floors though I have seen betonicifolia in the middle of a lawn.

PANTHER STORY NO.2

"I concur with Roger's sighting.

Some eleven years ago, for some unknown reason, I went out onto my front verandah at around 1.00am. It was a full moon, which as you know lights up the countryside almost like daylight. As I walked to the end of the verandah I was able to very clearly see, about three metres away, a large black, sleek animal, about the size of a large Labrador dog. However this was neither cat nor a dog as the shoulders and head were something to behold and the coat was shiny - nothing like a feral cat.

It slowly walked away and disappeared into the night. At that stage I didn't have a fence around the house and so the 'Panther" for the lack of a better name, was obviously checking the place out.

It was some time before I confessed to the sighting and copped a fair amount of flack about drinking / a full moon / seeing things in the night / being creative with my imagination / and it was surely just a feral cat! However, during the years a number of people have responded with similar sightings, many with multiple sightings, and in a variety of locations within the Strathbogie Ranges . So they are out there! What doesn't help are the people who create false film footage of these things which happened shortly after my sighting, as this generates cynicism in the general community. "
