#### BITS OF BOTANY AND BIRDS

#### Tiger orchid - Diuris sulphurea

Colonies of this orchid are in flower at the bottom end of Old Highlands road at the moment. Its stem is up to 50 cm tall and carries several large yellow flowers with dark brown markings. There are various other species of yellow Diuris orchids, mostly with animal names – donkey, leopard, snake, moth, all with different marking and mostly flowering at the start of Spring, not the end.

#### WATER SAFETY WEEK

27 November – 5 December 2010

With warmer weather just around the corner and more opportunities for a cool swim in the local dam, river or at the beach it is important to stay safe around water this summer.

The Royal Life Saving 2010 National Drowning Report was launched on 22 September and it held some alarming statistics. Between July 1st 2009 and June 30th 2010 there were 314 drowning deaths in Australian waterways. This figure is the highest it's been at any time in the last seven years and is a reversal of the long-term downward trend in drowning deaths.

The biggest increase in drowning (on the five year average) has occurred in lakes, dams and lagoons and more than 50 per cent of drowning deaths have happened outside major cities in regional areas.

Two high risk groups in the drowning statistics are children under the aged of five and people in the over 55s age group.

As younger children become more mobile they require greater supervision around water, both at home and when the family is out. Drowning in people over 55 now represents a third of all drowning deaths and people in this group need increased knowledge of the impact of health and medication on drowning, and the need to renew lifesaving skills.

The main things to remember about water safety: **Know the environment** – There are different safety rules for beaches, rivers, lakes and swimming pools. Beware of local water conditions and weather before going swimming. **Behave Safely** – Obey all water safety signs, make sure someone is looking out for you and don't mix alcohol and swimming.

Learn to swim – Being able to swim is an essential skill for water safety. Everybody, especially school aged children, should be taught to swim and how to stay afloat.

# NEW WORKPLACE LEARNING PROGRAMME FOR MITCHELL & MURRINDINDI SHIRES

The Workplace Learning Coordinators Program (WLCP) is a Department of Education and Early Childhood Development (DEECD) initiative and is in response to the Commonwealth Governments National Partnership of Youth Attainment and Transitions.

Working with the School to expand and supplement what already exists, the program will open up more opportunities for students aged 15 – 19 years of age to improve their skills and workplace knowledge through 'on the job' experience be it via Work Experience, Structured Workplace Learning (SWL) or School Based Apprenticeships/ Traineeships (SBATS). The program will also promote to industry the benefits of providing workplace learning opportunities to students within their business.

CVGT will be delivering the Workplace Coordinators Program within the Central Ranges LLEN geographical area which incorporates three LGA's, Murrindindi Shire Council, Mitchell Shire Council and Macedon Ranges.

Carmen Fifield is the appointed Workplace Learning Coordinator for Mitchell & Murrindindi Shires covering 9 secondary schools within the region based at Seymour. Carmen says "my role as WLC is to

□ increase the number of young people aged 15 to 19 years undertaking workplace learning placements in places of employment, especially within industries that provide strong vocational outcomes for young people;

□ increase the alignment between training provision and local industry needs;

□ increase the number of Koori young people undertaking workplace learning placements and;

generate and identify new workplace learning placement opportunities within the region

I will be working closely with schools, TAFEs, Adult Community Education Centres, Registered Training Organisations, industry and employer groups, and community groups to strengthen existing relationships and develop new partnerships to support workplace learning for our youth.
