Antechinuses in the house

If you think you have a mouse problem in your house, have another look at the dropping. If some are over 1cm long, thin and black, then you've probably got antechinuses - a small carnivorous marsupial - instead.

The most common species locally is the Agile Antechinus, which is about the same size as a mouse, maybe slightly larger, and has a more pointed face. I've found a few dead ones and they have very sharp and fierce-looking teeth, but so far all the live ones I've seen have kept their mouths firmly shut. They're very good climbers and get into our house by climbing up the outside mudbrick wall and finding a hole somewhere under the eaves. They seem to live in the spare bedding in the loft but we also find their droppings throughout the kitchen, and have seen them running down the kitchen walls a couple of times. From across the room I couldn't tell them from mice. Another local species, the Dusky Antechinus is a bit larger and doesn't climb, and Peg Lade has once found one in her house.

We've been setting Elliot traps baited with muesli mixed with peanut butter and honey, and have so far caught three from about 10 attempts, and released them away from the house. I'm hoping they find the experience scary enough not to come back inside, and to warn off all their friends. Strangely for marsupials they don't

Strangely for marsupials they don't have pouches, which I would have thought contradicted the very definition of marsupial! The males only live a year – dying exhausted after a few days vigorous mating.

LOCUST PLAQUE

The Department of Primary Industries has repeated its call to landholders to report locust egg laying as swarming activity increases over large parts of Victoria. State Locust Director Stephen Nee said locusts had taken flight across areas along the Murray and south of Swan Hill, with some swarms stretching up to 25kms.

Locust swarms can be unpredictable, but with warmer weather forecast in the state's north this weekend, it's expected that greater numbers of locusts may start to fly.

"We urge motorists to take care as swarms can impact on visibility when driving. Drivers should pull over or slow down if their vision is impaired by swarms." DPI Daily Situation Update -5.00pm, Saturday December 4, 2010

Yellow-faced honeyeater Lichenostomus chrysops

This little honeyeater spends the winter in NSW or southern Queensland and returns each spring to nest in the grapevine on our verandah. They build a new nest each year and it doesn't rest on a branch but is woven and suspended from 2-3 twigs like knitting on needles. The birds are a dark greyisholive-brown, paler below and with a distinct black-edged yellow stripe across the eye.

COMMUNITY MESSAGING PILOT IN YEA

Delivering key and critical messages to the community will be trialed in Yea before the end of the year with a Community Messaging System (CMS) across the northern Victorian town.

Murrindindi Shire Council Mayor Peter Beales said the system, developed by the not-for-profit EduHelp Foundation, would be extended from Yea High School to allow certified and authorised personnel to send messages direct to the local community.

The CMS will allow certified and authorised personnel to send messages direct to the local community via the SMS on the mobile phone. Funding for the project will come from philanthropy and grants assembled by the Bendigo Bank Community Fund, Berry Street, and other benevolent groups.
