




Did you make it to the Maree Camel Cup on July 6th??

Afghanistan is the only country in the world that **bans girls' secondary education**. In Afghanistan, 75% of girls are out of school.

Nearly 30% of girls in Afghanistan have never entered primary education. In December 2022, university education for women was suspended until further notice, affecting over 100,000 female students attending government and private higher education institutions (18 Jan 2023)

Beyond blocking basic access to food at risk, even the chance to walk in a park, play a sport, or enjoy nature is being stripped away from Afghanistan's women and girls. Women who protest these violations face terrible consequences including enforced disappearance, arbitrary detention, and torture (6 Feb 2024).

The agency estimates that **more than 1 million** girls are affected. The U.N. has warned that the ban on girls' education remains the Taliban's biggest obstacle to gaining recognition as the legitimate rulers of Afghanistan (**13 June 2024**)
