INSPIRING FACT

AS PART OF A GOVERNMENT ENERGY SAVING PLAN, French businesses must turn off their internal lights one hour after everyone has left - lighting in shop fronts can only remain on until 1.00am. The government hopes the ban will save 2 terrawatthours (TWh) of power a year equivalent to the energy consumption of around 750,000 homes - and reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 250,000 tonnes a year - it is also hoped the rule will reduce the impact that artificial lighting can have on ecosystems - for example, by altering migration and reproductive systems of animals - and reducing sleep disturbance for nearby residents EcoNews 310113.

WHAT'S GOING ON OUT THERE ? HCCC Landcare Cameras Will Tell You !

At our recent community meetings there has been strong interest in using new technologies to monitor native fauna and feral species.

As a result of this community input, HCCC Landcare has purchased six new movement activated cameras.

Bandicoot, **Quoll** and **Phascogale** spotters will now be able to record the presence and movement of any rare native fauna AND **Fox**, **Deer** and **Black Panther** hunters will also be invited to take advantage of this Landcare initiative.

A training session on the use of these cameras will be run at the Tablelands Community Centre (Old Ruffy School) on Saturday 24th August from 10am-11am followed by morning coffee at the Ruffy Produce Store.

Anyone interested in borrowing our cameras should attend this training

Colin Cook runs a business called "Monitor Cameras" and is an expert on setting up and using wildlife cameras. He is supplying our cameras and will run the training session.

The cameras will be available for loan from the Landcare office Please contact Janet Hagen if you are interested in attending.
