PADDOCK TREE SPECIES

It had been suggested at a recent Landcare meeting that we give landholders some information on species that are found in our area and are ideal for paddock trees. Over the coming months we will be publishing information on some of the more suitable tree species with a shortlist of growing conditions, rate of growth and typical lifespan. By Simone Ulstrup

Narrow-leaf Peppermint Eucalyptus radiata

The Narrow-leaf Peppermint is a medium to tall tree with a dense canopy, making it a great shade tree. It is native to Victoria, New South Wales and Tasmania and its timber was commonly used for fencing and basic construction, although it is no longer preferred due to its high shrinkage rate and veining. The Narrow-leaf Peppermint was one of the first eucalypt species to be commercially utilised for its oil which is distilled from its leaves. It is tolerant of light snow and frost and can withstand positions in full sun to part shade.

It can be prone to root decay and tends to sustain damage easily in wind storms.



Family: Myrtaceae
Height: 15-40 metres
Lifespan: Short lived, 30 years approx.
Growth rate: Medium-fast.
Soil preferred: Poor gravely soils, moist to dry, well drained.
Appearance: Dull green thin highly aromatic leaves, fine fibrous interlaced grey bark.
Flowers: Small white flowers from October to January

* "People living near Handcock's huge Warrenbayne pine plantation organised a well attended public forum in Violet Town last Sunday to discuss increasing community concern over clusters of rare cancers affecting local people.

The plantations, like many throughout Victoria, were planted by the Victorian Government prior to being privatised in the 1990's. Surrounding communities have health concerns following decades of use of various sprays applied from the ground and from aircraft. Of greatest concern is the probable presence of dioxins similar to those contained in Agent Orange during the Vietnam War and at CFA Yarram.

Dr John Edgar, retired CSIRO scientist, spoke to us about the toxicology of dioxins.

Local resident, Erin Levy, outlined her family's exposure over more than three decades. The exposure of civilians and soldiers during the Vietnam War and of CFA members at Yarram were also discussed.

The meeting passed a number of resolutions including that Handcocks notify all adjacent landholders explaining when and what they plan to spray and that Handcocks monitor all residuals publicly and transparently through independent analysis.

Amongst other resolutions the meeting asked that government of various levels employ more properly trained staff to monitor regulations."—Robyn Walsh, Yarck. 5773 4304

NOTICE TO RUFFY RESIDENTS

As part of the conditions for the **Neighbourhood Safer Place** (NSP) at the Ruffy Recreation Reserve, the fuel load along the approach roads to the NSP needs to be managed periodically to ensure that access during fire conditions will be as safe as possible.

The Ruffy Rural Fire Brigade in conjunction with the Shire of Strathbogie is therefore planning a *trial burn of light fuel*, to be conducted in April when

conditions are suitable. A stretch along **Buntings Hill Road**, a maximum of 100 m either side of the junction with Noye Lane, has been targeted for this limited scale trial burn, and adjoining landholders are being personally contacted. The trial burn will be conducted in accordance with relevant DEPI,

Shire and CFA guidelines.

Following the trial burn, a meeting will be held to inform the Ruffy community of any planned further fuel reduction burns and to discuss any issues that might arise. For any further information, please contact the Captain of the Ruffy
