Gliders and Possums

Whiteheads Creek Landcare wrapped up this stage of its Gliders & Possums project

Perhaps some thought we knew all there was to know about nest boxes, but we soon learned there was lots more fascinating stuff.

Guest speaker Ray Thomas, famous for his Regent Honeyeater project at Lurg, East of Benalla, gave an enthralling talk highlighting their experience and giving tips on how to make a nest box project really work. Ray has over 400 boxes installed and told us that Squirrel Gliders being larger can pick the best locations, although a family of Sugar Gliders can also pack some clout. In our area we are far more likely to see Sugar Gliders or Phascogales than Squiirel Gliders. We might also see Yellow Footed Antechinus, a small carnivorous marsupial that shelters in tree stumps along the roadsides, (may be sometimes seen on Kobyboyn Road near Alan Coulson's in daylight on a suitable day).



Ray made a few points for nest hox success:

Place the box facing to the SE on a tree that provides shade on 40 degree davs.

- * Nest boxes are not as good at insulation as an actual tree hollow.
- * Place the boxes high enough to be less accessible to ferals and not so high that you can't inspect them.
- * The hole should be small, for Gliders and Phascogales, only 40mm, but Brushtail Possums and Ringtail Possums need larger holes. They are also very beneficial for the bush, as the Brushtails eat emergent Mistletoe.

A BIT of HUGHES CREEK CATCHMENT HISTORY.....continued

Recollections of Streams in the North East Victoria

This is the 2nd instalment of this memoir as supplied to Anne Shovelton by Mr JJ Hill of Ruffy

In 1920/21 we had one hundred acres rented around the Dhurringile Homestead, Toolamba, hence the fishing in the channels.

At the same time the home base was one farm on the Sevens Creek followed by one on the Castle Creek in the Branjee area.

The Castle Creek had quite a lot of Macquaries and Blackfish and the Sevens Creek, from the farm, five miles from Euroa was loaded with small Trout Cod, Macquaries and Blackfish.

The Sevens Creek in drought years often stopped running from Euroa down, concentrating the fish in the deeper pools and for a few weeks the fishing was fast and furious. Fish in the main were Trout Cod and Macquaries to two pounds. In those days there were miles of those waters, all heavily stocked with trout cod (small) and Macquaries likewise.

In those days it seemed impossible that mere fishing would overtake supply in the Goulburn River which I fished at Molesworth, Cathkin, Alexandra and Thornton.

In those stretches of the Goulburn in those days at Christmas and Easter, it was estimated that campers numbered 500 to the mile of the river. They came from Melbourne by train and the local farmers carted their camping gear to the river and I have no doubt profited quite considerably by doing just that.

It would seem at the time that it would be utterly impossible to eliminate the Trout Cod and the Macquaries from the waters they inhabited. But around 1922 or 1923, the old Eildon Weir was built and acted, I believe, as a settling dam and the water became crystal clear and I believe the smaller fish became easy prey for the large Trout Cod and Redfin then inhabiting the river.

In the Eildon itself, various stretches were teeming (Big River) with small Macquaries and in the UT Creek area, I landed at least 20 small cod proclaiming at least two breeding grounds for Trout Cod and Macquaries.

The Cod fishing deteriorated in the Goulburn and the Macquaries to a lesser extent, but after the greater Eildon Weir was built in the late Forties, both fish have been practically wiped out, at least as a fishing proposition.

In so far as the Macquaries are concerned, the breeding grounds have been destroyed by the colder water or siltation.

I believe that where the main streams enter our reservoirs, new breeding grounds will have to be established not by releasing fry but establishing natural breeding places by the use of spawn or eggs in a natural setting in the river beds to which mature fish will return when their turn comes to drop their spawn.

From what some of the older residents have told me in the Riverina, streams completely dried up in severe droughts (before Samuel McCaughey built dams on them) but the small cod and big appeared back in the streams as soon as those streams began to flow again.

Their breeding grounds would be headwater streams that did not stop flowing.
