SEYMOUR'S OWN

37th Infantry Battalion AIF, 1916



This year is the 100th anniversary of the formation of the 37th Infantry Battalion AIF in Seymour. They trained at Seymour Army Camp, and set out from Seymour Railway Station in June 1916. Training intensively on Salisbury Plain in England they subsequently arrived in France in November 1916. At the end, of one thousand men there remained a fighting strength of just ninety. Protesting at their tight knit unit being broken up, they were immortalised as **"The Indivisibles"**.

The Australian Light Horse Memorial Park Committee would be very pleased if any relatives or friends of the 37th could attend at the unveiling of a commemorative plinth to celebrate the men of the 37th Battalion AIF on Saturday 15 October 2016 at 10.30AM at Railway Place, Seymour (opposite the Railway Station)

BLACKBERRY



Blackberry was first introduced to Australia in the early 1800's, it has been estimated to have spread through 8.8 million hectares. Blackberry spreads by seed, rooting of cane tips and suckers. Blackberry not only reduces pasture production it prevents access to waterways and provides harbour for pest animals such as rabbits and foxes. One berry can contain up to 80 seeds which can spread locally or at distance by birds and other animals. Blackberry is best sprayed when in flower, November to late February. If conditions are suitable spraying can start in November and continue through to May. Spraying should not continue after the leaves change colour. Blackberry should not be burnt on site as this can encourage seed germination. A chemical subsidy is available from HCCC Landcare. Contact Janet Hagen 57904268

HIGHLANDS RAMBLERS WALK

In surprising sunshine on 25th September twenty people aged from eleven to eighty walked with Andrew Shaw from Spaniak Road along Woolshed Creek to the dam on 'Strathnaver'.

It was a beautiful day for walking, the countryside very green and lush, and we were rewarded by glimpses of platypus frolicking in the water when we reached the dam.

Prof. Neil Phillips observed "One thing that was not lacking on the walk was granite. The early stage was open paddocks with scattered low outcrops that were well spread out. These were coarse and had the characteristic large white feldspar grains found throughout the Highlands district. A distinctive mineral here was cordierite, relatively



uncommon in granites globally but very widespread in the Strathbogie Ranges."
