CLINT COMES FULL CIRCLE & BUNGLE BOORI BENEFITS

Clint Storer 37, grew up on his father's farm at Balnarring and from an early age he knew that he wanted to be a farmer.

Soon after being appointed manager at Bungle Boori in late 2015 he said to his partner Megan "Have a look around and take it all in, because we'll never get to work in such a beautiful place again".

The irony is that Clint has actually come full circle. Back in 1998 as a young fellow he was a farming apprentice for 3 1/2 years with Rob Hayes, just up the Tarcombe-Ruffy road, before deciding to move north to the Yass district to develop his knowledge of broadacre cropping.

However, it's working with stock that Clint likes best. He acknowledges the training that Rob gave him in how to read and handle stock, particularly sheep, and when Rob gave him his first dog it opened up a whole new world for Clint. He now prides himself on his working dogs and over the years he has trained and sold both sheep dogs and gun dogs. He says that the major challenges in his role as manager are to improve his own skills, especially with cattle and to continue the property's progress with fat lambs.

Before coming to Bungle Boori Clint was the assistant manager at 'Jigsaw Farms' at Hamilton where they ran about 40,000 sheep. It was while in the western district that he met Megan who also has a connection with the industry, being the daughter of the gun shearer 'Daffy' Ryan.

Talking of guns; apart from training and working his dogs Clint is a keen duck hunter (he's at Goroke this weekend for duck opening) and he's a competition shooter with Seymour Field & Game.

Since moving into the district Clint & Megan have demonstrated their commitment to both the environment and the community with their attendance at Landcare meetings and at the

recent Strathbogie Shire's "Listening Tour" at Ruffy.

As Bungle Boori straddles the Strathbogie and Mitchell Shires, Clint is well credentialed to compare their delivery of services.

He says "...whereas I've seen the Mitchell grader 6 times since late 2015, I've never seen the Strathbogie grader in this part of the world and the condition of their roads is testament to that!"



Post Truth or Post Values?

"We are told we now live in a "post truth" era, highlighted by the election of President Trump. The phrase, as I understand it, refers to the way discussion takes place in the media and other forums when opinion takes priority over facts and truth. You could write a book about the number of times Trump expressed opinions in complete distortion of the facts. It operates in our own media and political debates as well. Beware when someone prefaces his or her comments with; 'the fact of the matter is...' or 'the truth of the matter is...'.

What makes it more reprehensible is that often the opinion is a deliberate distortion of the facts and therefore the truth. It is particularly evident when politicians denigrate the opposite party's policy simply

because they are the opposition regardless of the merits of the policy.

What worries me most about this cavalier treatment of the truth is that many of us don't seem to really care; we seem content to just let it pass by, we don't challenge it, leaving us to sit with our own ignorance and prejudices. We do tend to like our opinions being confirmed rather than listen to opposing views.

There is however an underlying issue which is even more disturbing. In the midst of this post-fact, posttruth world does it mean that we have also entered a world of "postvalues". Again it was and continues to be highlighted by Trump and a number of world and Australian leaders. What are the values behind our treatment of asylum seekers? Where are our values in regard to climate change? What are Trump's values? Is pragmatism really a value? Or is it just a convenience? What do you think?" Stuart Reid—Highlands
