PEOPLE AND PLACES

A PIECE of LOCAL HISTORY POSTED from TARCOMBE

The Granite News mailbox recently received information from Jan Hayes regarding the former Post Office at Tarcombe.

Postal services began at Tarcombe on 4th November 1887 when a Post Office was opened under the control of Alexander Findlay who was to remain in charge until 1893. Very few details of the operations of the Post Office are known, however for the years 1887 and 1891 the salary and letter traffic statistics are available.

In 1887 the Postmaster's annual salary was 16 Pounds and there were 2,472 letters processed. By 1891 the letter throughput had risen to 3,311 but the annual salary had declined to 13 Pounds.

There was a succession of names recorded as Postmaster during the first two decades of the 20th century and in 1920 a Mr J. Bunting listed as Receiving Officer (an alternative name for Postmaster at small offices) is recorded as deceased and control of the office was transferred to Frank R. Tubb. Mr Tubb remained until October 1926 when he was succeeded by Walter A. Earl, who had been a Mail Contractor for the Longwood East to Tarcombe mail route between 1902 and 1905.

Mr. Earl appears to have remained at the Tarcombe Post Office until it closed on 31st January 1943. Tarcombe residents were then served by roadside delivery from Longwood. Information supplied by Colin Duggan, Curator/Historian—Post Office Museum Victoria

Footnote: The substantial remains of the old Tarcombe Post Office can still be seen as you drive through the Hayes family's 'Tarcombe Herefords' property on the Tarcombe-Ruffy Road.



The ANZAC Day Beersheba Bash

It was with a sense of irony that we looked at the puddle that represented the pitch for the 3rd game in a now 5 match series. A century ago Col. Maygar and his men went 36 hours in their desert wilderness, desperate for the moisture that we didn't want.



The 'sticky wicket' presented no challenge to Maygar's Men from the flat country, and the Wilderness boys from the hills could only dream that their local roads were this good.

The pitch, which could have featured in the Australia v India test series except that it had some grass and Subaru tyre tracks (it pulled the roller) miraculously drained like the MCG and played like the Adelaide Oval. Now that I think about it, Indian pitches probably do have tyre tracks. In front of a large & boisterous crowd in Bay 13 (aka the Dam Bank) and on the Hill, 'Maygar's Men' (looking suspiciously like Euroa Cricket Club) ambushed 'The Wilderness' who resembled a bunch of ageing Bedouins. Best for Maygar's Men were Pizzle, Elvis (we knew he wasn't dead), the Mackrell and anyone who retired (which was just about everybody else). Best for The Wilderness were Old Mate Larwood, Keeper, Offy and the Bloke in Shorts (I kid you not, they're in the scorebook).

Many thanks to Umpire David Mastin and Jenny Houghton's Maygar's Hill Winery team for the great lunch and a great cricket venue. We look forward to the return match on 29th October at Maygar Reserve - Ruffy, which will be 2 days before the Centenary of the charge of the Light Horse at Beersheba. By Scott McKay
