

What is Education For?

During the recent education debate over Gonski, the CEO of the Catholic Education office in NSW said on TV, that the aim of school education is to 'get people into heaven'.
As someone who regards 'heaven' as purely a metaphor, I was rather taken back. Having been an educator in another life, I started to think again about the aim of education.

I suspect there are many views on this. Listening to some educators, politicians and business people today, you get the feeling that the main aim is to prepare people for employment. Others would stress the importance of imparting good values and maybe religious ones at that.

When I look back to my own education, I suspect the authorities saw education as forming good, obedient & conforming citizens.

Yet others with perhaps an I.T. hat on, may say that real education needs to prepare people to be problem solvers. Recently it was suggested that at least one of the aims of education was to be able to live with and work in a world with Artificial Intelligence.

One for which I have strong sympathy is called 'critical education'. This entails encouraging people to be sceptical of the status quo, by critically analysing society with a view to changing it into a more just and creative one.

Recently I read an article entitled 'The Usefulness of Useless Knowledge' a reprint from the 1930's. It was written by Abraham Flexner an educator, best known for setting up the Institute for Advanced Study at Princeton University (an associate of Einstein). In the article, he says "the aim of education is to create a civilization worth saving." I suspect that is a tall order, but a worthy one.
