City Heat V Country Scorchers Saturday 20th January 2018 at the Ruffy Cauldron

Rule 10 in deference to The Richie's said "you're not allowed to complain about how hot it is" and on a day when the whole ground was a hotspot and your snicko would have melted, we were fortunate enough to have the Comedy duo Jim and Tom McCooey putting on a show for the ages. Tom the complete right-handed batsmen, bowler and wicket keeper happily admits that his ability was not inherited from his father. Jim also a right-handed batsmen, who swings lustily on the off-side, differs markedly from his son because he doesn't do what Tom does - connect. Jim is one of those rare cricketers, who bats right-handed and bowls left-handed and on the evidence to date he should have a go the other way around. Next game is the annual Highlands V Ruffy match at Molesworth on Saturday 24 February.

Murrindindi Council to consider Business and Tourism Innovation Grants Policy

Murrindindi Shire Council is considering a policy which proposes a program of Business and Tourism Innovation Grants. This represents a fresh, strategic approach to attracting investment in the Shire from new and existing businesses. The proposed grants are also intended to support tourism events that aim to attract visitors to Murrindindi Shire. The idea is that this grant funding will help grow existing businesses, start businesses & support sustainable events that grow tourism. If adopted by Council, the grants will be open to applications by mid-February for a four week period. The total funding pool for this financial year is up to \$280,000. Any unallocated funds will be returned to Council's Infrastructure Renewal Reserve to fund the long term renewal of our community assets.

Murrindindi Shire—Rates 2018

Murrindindi Shire rates are due soon and there is now a new and easier "set and forget" way to pay your rates.

Residents can now pay their rates by direct debit.


Murrindindi Council is making some changes to ensure it is as easy as possible to pay your rates. This will make it easier for people to budget for rates payments on a regular basis.

Residents can now opt to have their rates direct debited from a bank account fortnightly. The fortnightly date is the same as the majority of pension paydays.

They can also choose to pay monthly (on the 28th of each month) by direct debit, or by quarterly instalments which are

deducted automatically on the four due dates. There's also an extended payment due date of 31 May each year for people who've registered to pay their rates with fortnightly or monthly direct debits.
