4F for Freaks – Leigh Hobbs

Leigh Hobbs' artwork just lends itself to drawing 'freaks' and boy is 4F full of them! Such strange students as Nearlynormal Nancy, Scary Mary, Louisa the Teaser and Feral Beryl are all introduced to the new teacher - Miss Corker. A FERAL FEAST- A TASTY RABBIT PAPPARDELLE

Ever wanted a great recipe for Rabbit?? Try this fantastic Italian inspired recipe that is very simple yet seems to showcase all the individual ingredients. (recipe from Australian Gourmet Traveller- April 2012)

Ingredients: 60 ml Olive oil 1 Jointed Rabbit, dusted in seasoned flour 4 red onions 4 garlic cloves 2 tbs rosemary- chopped 150ml Dry white wine 400ml Chicken stock Pappardelle pasta Balsamic vinegar and parmesan to serve Preheat oven to 140 deg. Heat oil in frying pan and cook rabbit until golden.

Heat remaining oil in casserole dish, add onions and cook gently for 16-18 mins, stir in garlic and rosemary. Add wine, simmer, then add stock and rabbit. Cover with a lid and cook until rabbit is falling off the bone. (min 11/2 hours). Remove meat and shred.

Cook pasta as per packet directions, or if your game make your own!

Simmer braising liquid, reduce by ½, add rabbit meat and season to taste.

Serve drizzled with balsamic vinegar and parmesan.

MURRINDINDI FILM SOCIETY'S JULY SCREENING

In June the Society hosted a very successful "Australian Nostalgia Night". The Shiralee and The Overlanders.were both shown in 16mm format and were much appreciated by a large turn-out of members. On Friday 20th July we return to digital presentation with the 1950 drama Three Came Home, an adaptation of Agnes Newton Keith's best selling WW2 memoir about the three years she spent as a prisoner of war of the Japanese in Borneo and Sarawak. Together with other British and American wives, Agnes is unaware of the fate of her husband who has been incarcerated elsewhere.

A successful author before the war, she is treated with respect by Col. Suga, the camp commander, a cultured man who knows and appreciates her work and takes a personal interest in her. He is however unable to protect her from suffering at the hands of other officers. This is an engrossing drama which demonstrates that compassion and humanity can survive through the most trying of circumstances. Claudette Colbert gives a remarkable performance as Agnes, and Sessue Hayakawa is memorable as the dignified colonel.
