THE BUZZ ON BEES

Beekeepers or apiarists fall into two categories.

There are hobby beekeepers, like me, who might have one hive or a dozen or more and whose bees deliver enough honey each season for consumption by their own household and friends or as a gift jar or two.

And as a bonus the 40 to 60,000 or so bees that are usually contained in a strong hive will pollinate your home garden or vegetable plot especially flowering plants and often those others which can be located almost anywhere within a five kilometre or so radius.

Then there are large scale apiarists or migratory beekeepers which usually travel their hives over significant distances in the search for a honey flow - i.e. a flower, a broad acre crop like canola or lucerne or just gum trees that are flowering.

It is not uncommon for migratory or commercial beekeepers in Victoria to have a thousand or more hives.

In fact one of Victoria's largest beekeepers is based near Rochester and has another operation at Hillston in NSW.

Another based at Castlemaine, thought to produce about 200 tonnes of honey each season from about 2,500 hives, works throughout northern Victoria including the Little Desert which has some unique vegetation that flowers seasonally.

So they have several semi trailers, a couple of mobile loaders and they travel their bees and hives depending on the season and what they determine to be the best source for honey.

(For the record most commercially produced honey finishes up in the plastic squeezy bottles in the supermarket. I think it's a bit like cask wine, so if you want some really tasty, flavoursome honey try the apiarist with the stall on the side of the road, or one at a local market.

He and sometimes she will invariably have red gum, grey box, messmate, orchard or similar specifically sourced varieties and to my palate the darker the honey the tastier it will be.

Other honeys are site specific - try some Kangaroo Island, Queensland Rainforest, NZ Manuka or Tasmanian Leatherwood and you will taste the difference).

Commercial pollination is another important aspect for big beekeepers.

In recent years there has been major almond tree plantation development around Robinvale. Now if you don't pollinate your almond trees with bees each year you don't get an almond nut next year.

I have seen up to 100,000 hives on the almonds at Robinvale and these included hives that were brought in from as far north as Glen Innes and Toowoomba by the B-double load.

And the beekeeper gets something like \$50 to 60 a hive for the month for having his bees on hire for the pollination work.

This is important as the bees while they are flying pollinating the trees don't actually make much honey, so the 'off season' hive rental is the main source of income for the beekeeper while they are on the road.

Pollination by bees is critical to the strong production of many crops especially in horticulture, including fruit trees, plus olives, clover, lucerne, oilseeds and many others.

In fact it is said that honey bees (scientific name apis mellifera) provide the pollination that results in something like 75% of the world's annual food production.

Beekeeping is a time honoured hobby or production system as there are records of hives going back thousands of years in ancient civilisations.

In the Strathbogies and the local area there are a number of small honey producers plus there are a couple of migratory beekeepers who bring their hives here when seasonal conditions are right.

But the looming problem is a mite known as varroa. It has devastated the bee population in many countries (including New Zealand) and if it gets into Australia it has been estimated to cause \$1 billion in damage to our agricultural sector.

Beekeeping is great for the backyarder.

If you do it properly it is quite safe, wonderfully stimulating and quite exciting to see all your little fellas (mainly the female bees) flying about.

But you must register your hives with the DPI at a very modest annual cost and you must be free of diseases. Most established apiarists also happily share their knowledge. Just be involved and learn on the way. **By John Kennedy**
