Introduction

People have got the impression that the merino is a gentle, bleating animal that gets its living without trouble to anybody, and comes up every year to be shorn with a pleased smile upon its amiable face. It is my purpose here to exhibit the merino sheep in its true light.

First let us give him his due. No one can accuse him of being a ferocious animal. No one could ever say that a sheep attacked him without provocation; although there is an old bush story of a man who was discovered in the act of killing a neighbour's wether.

"Hello!" said the neighbour, "What's this? Killing my sheep! What have you got to say for yourself?"

"Yes," said the man, with an air of virtuous indignation. "I am killing your sheep. I'll kill any man's sheep that bites me!"

But as a rule the merino refrains from using his teeth on people. He goes to work in another way.

The Art of Dying

The truth is that he is a dangerous monomaniac, and his one idea is to ruin the man who owns him. With this object in view he will display a talent for getting into trouble and a genius for dying that are almost incredible.

If a mob of sheep see a bush fire closing round them, do they run away out of danger? Not at all, they rush round and round in a ring till the fire burns them up.

If they are in a river-bed, with a howling flood coming down, they will stubbornly refuse to cross three inches of water to save themselves. Dogs may bark and men may shriek, but the sheep won't move. They will wait there till the flood comes and drowns them all, and then their corpses go down the river on their backs with their feet in the air.

A mob will crawl along a road slowly enough to exasperate a snail, but let a lamb get away in a bit of rough country, and a racehorse can't head him back again. If sheep are put into a big paddock with water in three corners of it, they will resolutely crowd into the fourth, and die of thirst.

There is a well-authenticated story of a ship-load of sheep that was lost because an old ram jumped overboard, and all the rest followed him. No doubt they did, and were proud to do it.

A sheep won't go through an open gate on his own responsibility, but he would gladly and proudly "follow the leader" through the red-hot portals of Hades: and it makes no difference whether the lead goes voluntarily, or is hauled struggling and kicking and fighting every inch of the way.

They have continued to plant out erosion gullies, creeks and steep hill country in this 450-ha (1100-acre) beef property. The property has also since changed its grazing regime, made possible by land classification and slowly decreasing the size of paddocks. There is still a long way to go, but the benefits can already be seen. They have also built laneways to the west, centre and north of their property, making herd management far simpler. Most of the rotations can now be done easily by one person. You are welcome to come for a farm tour. As well as mass plantings, you will see how they drought-proofed five (and potentially more) paddocks on the north side of the property by pumping water up to a saddle with a 130-m head. This 28 000-L tank now feeds troughs in surrounding paddocks that were unusable in 2006 due to lack of water. But, if none of this appeals, come for the views! Limestone boasts some spectacular hills on the edge of the Black Range. This might be a chance to glimpse part of your catchment you have never seen before. A light lunch will be provided and, weather permitting, you can enjoy it in Coolongolook's shady garden.

PLAN YOUR FIREBREAKS THIS WINTER

While summer and the fire season seems a long way off as we shiver in this unusually cold and wet winter, now is actually the time to think about firebreaks and how to plan and prepare them.

Traditionally many landowners in the past would burn breaks with the assistance of the local brigade in late spring or early summer. These breaks were often quite wide, up to 100m, and were placed around buildings, pumps and power poles with transformers, along road reserves and especially along railway lines in the days of steam trains.

Most farmers had their own firefighting units and neighbours would help each other burn the breaks. Now it is rare to see breaks being burned and only few landholders have significant fire units. This is partly because the window of opportunity to burn breaks is more limited under CFA and local government regulations. Further, many brigades are reluctant to have their volunteers' time taken up with burning breaks. These days it is all-toocommon to see landholders making little effort to protect their assets or to do so with quite inadequate measures.

Winter is the time to implement your fire protection strategies when not much farm activity is going on. With climate uncertainty, longer and hotter summers and fewer (and older) CFA volunteers, landholders will have to be much better prepared for the inevitable fires that will be experienced.

One of the stark realities of Black Saturday was that most of the fire brigades in this area were called out to Wandong or Broadford and large areas and many towns were left without a truck on what was the worst day ever experienced. Communities like Avenel, Longwood and Ruffy were highly vulnerable to a fast moving grass fire had it occurred. Many landholders would not be aware of the near disaster for Longwood in the 1965 fire that tragically took the lives of seven women and children.

Firebreaks can be formed by a variety of means. The most effective is a wide strip (30m and preferably wider) that is fenced permanently or seasonally with electric fencing. In arable country the pasture can be mown for hay, slashed or grazed heavily in late winter - early spring. A great advantage in mowing/ slashing in cold conditions is that sheep will quite dramatically preferentially graze the area and temporary fencing is not necessary.
