Many of the country gardens have the added bonus of beautiful settings with expansive views and others offer the serenity of secluded river banks and the sound of water rippling by; a magical place to stay awhile to relax and reflect.

Some of the gardens have specialist plant collections and one garden offers a unique and fascinating collection of historic farm machinery and tools which are tucked artfully throughout the garden. Another two are Land For Wildlife properties and as well as the garden around the house, you will enjoy the enhanced bush and wetland settings.

Yea Garden Club is holding their annual plant sale over the weekend and will offer an extensive range of treasures at bargain prices. The local Seed Savers group will also offer a range of modern and heritage vegetable and flower seeds for sale.

Morning and afternoon teas will be on offer in several gardens and picnic lunches can be enjoyed at several beautiful and well appointed parks nearby or sample the many excellent culinary delights in the local restaurants or cafes.

LANDCARER OF THE MONTH AWARD OCTOBER 2012

Perseverance-A tale of Purple to Green

For this month's Landcarer award we would like to recognise the efforts of several people in the Highlands area who have made a substantial effort over the years to control Patterson's Curse.

Peter Cowling, Liz Nixon, Brian Cook and James Simonsen bought their Highlands property in 2005.

The pasture was non-existent and had a heavy infestation of Patterson's curse. Previously there had been sporadic, mostly unsuccessful attempts to control the weed which was spreading quite alarmingly.

The farm is part of the Blue Top Paterson's curse project and in 7 years they have reduced the weeds impact by at least 95 %. When mapping the area's to spray for the helicopter this year it was extremely difficult to find and was only on the most inaccessible parts of the farm. Originally, they had to do up to 3 loads from the chopper plus untold loads by hand with the Highlands Landcare spray unit each year.

Now the farm is covered in Microleena, Wallaby grass and thousands of trees and they are down to less than a load from the chopper and the rest is maintained using a Quad Bike.

You can control Patterson's Curse or you can beat it into submission like these 4 have. It does take time, planning, perseverance and a lot of hard work but the results they have achieved are remarkable. By Scott McKay

A FERAL FEAST-STINGING NETTLE RAVIOLI

(Recipe taken from Australian Gourmet Traveller April 2012)

Nettles can be eaten when they're young, as is done in many parts of Europe. Cooking or drying neutralises the toxic components, and nettles can be used as a tea or in soup, blanched for a salad or used in any dish as you would spinach. Nettles are high in nutrients such iron, magnesium and nitrogen. If you get them out before they set seed they can be added to compost or dug in as a green manure crop.

INGREDIENTS:

700G Firm ricotta 40g each of pecorino and parmesan, extra to garnish 2 egg yolks, plus 1 egg for egg wash 250g cavolo nero (black leaf cabbagesimilar to Kale or spinach) 100ml olive oil 60g butter chopped 6 cloves of garlic sliced 2 tbs golden raisins 2 tbs thyme

NETTLE PASTA DOUGH 100g nettles 250g plain flour 2 eggs

METHOD:

For the pasta dough blanch the nettles until bright green, refresh, drain and squeeze out excess water, finely chop then combine with flour and eggs, process in food processor to combine. Turn onto a work surface knead until smooth 3-5 minutes, wrap in plastic wrap and set aside at room temperature for approx. 1 hour.

Meanwhile process cheeses yolks and nutmeg in a food processor until combined, season to taste and refrigerate until required.

Divide dough into four, working with one piece at a time feed through a pasta machine or roll out until desired thickness is achieved.

Place tablespoons of ricotta filling at 2cm intervals along half the pasta sheets. Brush around fillings with eggwash, top with remaining pasta and press around firmly to seal.Cut into ravioli squares transfer to a lightly floured tray and refrigerate until required.

Blanch cavolo nero, drain, refresh and set aside. Heat oil and butter, add garlic, raisins, thyme and cavolo nero and stir until garlic is tender.

Cook ravioli in boiling salted water until al dente 2-3 minutes, drain and add to frying pan, toss to combine. Serve with shavings of parmesan.

One Night – Margaret Wild

Margaret Wild is well known for her award winning picture text books, but in recent years she has turned her considerable talent to writing for Young Adults. SOUTHEAST AUSTRALIAN TEMPERATURE OUTLOOK

The southeast Australian temperature outlook averaged over October to December 2012 shows that: warmer days and nights are more likely over southeast Australia

This outlook is mostly a result of persistent warmer than normal waters in the Indian Ocean, with a lesser influence from warmer than normal tropical Pacific waters.

The chances that the average October to December maximum temperature will exceed the long-term median maximum temperature are above 70% over most of southeast Australia, with slightly weaker odds in northwest SA. Probabilities rise above 80% over Victoria, the southeast agricultural districts of SA, the southern half of NSW and eastern Tasmania.

This means that for every ten years with ocean patterns like the current, about seven to eight October to December periods would be expected to be warmer than average over these areas, with about two to three being cooler.

Outlook confidence is related to how consistently the Pacific and Indian Oceans affect Australian temperatures. During the October to December period, history shows this effect on maximum temperatures to be moderately consistent over most of SA, Victoria and northeast Tasmania.
