#### **PEOPLE AND PLACES**

### TAKE A STEEP HILL LANDFORM AND MAKE IT PRODUCTIVE

Big steep hills are often less productive, hard to manage and maintain and can be a liability for farmers.

Let's face it - the Murrindindi and adjacent shires have plenty of them that are often neglected. Those with few trees are particularly prone to erosion and access can be a significant problem for fire fighting agencies.

Sadly such land forms are sometimes regarded as of limited economic value.

How one family farm is addressing the problems of steep hills, increasing their productivity for cattle in particular, as well as revegetating them so that they become an asset to the region and their owners, was addressed by a recent farm walk conducted by the Yea River Catchment Landcare Group.

Judy Brookes and Duncan Hall are the owners of the 450 ha, or 1,100 acre property 'Coolongolook' at Limestone, south-east of Yea.

Their land form is largely a series of steep hills with altitudes varying from the flatter more productive slopes at a little over 320 metres above sea level to a series of very steep hill tops rising to almost 550 metres in elevation.

While in large measure it is still a work in progress, their success so far has given excellent guidance about how to enhance and improve the farming value of our steep hill country.

Their plan was to fertilise the property based on soil tests (a third of the property is tested each year); land-classify the hills (according to aspect and 'flats' from hills) and decrease the size of paddocks for better grazing management; fence off and plant out deep erosion gullies and landslips (which then become wildlife corridors and shelter belts); and improve water resources to drought-proof the property.

By fencing according to land classification, the less productive, north facing slopes, for example, can be better managed (and in some cases planted out to exclude stock altogether).

They are also focussing on decreasing paddock sizes. Large mobs of cattle are now rotated through these paddocks, grazing them more productively.

We quickly learned our fencing skills" Judy says "and chose a steel fencing system as a possible bushfire response".

Another recognition was that the water resources in almost a quarter of their property failed during dry times and thus limited stocking capacity. So a multi-paddock watering system was designed and installed.

Water is now pumped against a 130 metre head from a reliable dam to a 23,000 litre header tank situated at over 500 metres elevation from where it gravity feeds to multiple stock troughs in adjoining paddocks.

Revegetating the property and enhancing the biodiversity has become a passion and the owners have now planted between 15,000 and 17,000 trees on the property.

They have targeted unproductive hill slopes, landslips, gaping gullies and swampy areas for both environmental and practical reasons, planting these fenced-off areas with trees and shrubs indigenous to the area.

Another nearby gully is being fenced and planted over the next two to three years.

It is adjoined by a new laneway system which facilitates stock movement from the hills to the flats and down to the cattle yards.

And is one of three stock laneways that give access to the west, north and east of the property.

But their success can be measured both by the attractive appearance of the property and its obviously increased productivity.

Coolongolook is currently running its (predominantly Red Angus) 200 breeding cows plus their yearlings from the previous drop.

Judy and Duncan's achievements in revitalising their steep hill slopes warrant repetition and recognition locally.



#### **Hughes Creek Day By John Bennett**

On the 16th of October, the grades 4, 5 and 6 went down Hughes Creek road to do activities and assessments. Avenel Primary School was there too.

First of all, we walked up to the creek's edge and watched to people go electro - fishing. Electro – fishing is where one person has a battery pack and sends electric currents through the water. The fish get attracted to it, and then they get temporarily stunned. When they are stunned, another person catches the fish. Then we'd have a look at the fish. They caught a blackfish, some yabbies, a mountain galaxius, and a humongous carp.

We also did a bug survey, where we had tubs of the creek water and bugs, and we collected the bugs and worked out what kinds of bugs they were. We found things like: side-swimmers, whirligig beetles, fly larvae, may fly larvae, and stonefly nymph.

The next activity was where we were split up into 5 groups in different places and collected all the different types of plants we could find. Then we worked out what kinds of plants were growing where. After all that, we were very tired, but we definitely had fun.
