#### **BITS OF BOTANY & BIRDS**

**More on Misunderstood Mistletoe** 



Australian ecologist David Watson has spent more than a decade studying mistletoes across three continents in a mission to revamp the reputation of these odd parasitic plants.

What he has discovered will challenge everything you thought you knew about the botanical hangers-on.

Mistletoes are found on every continent except Antarctica.

Mistletoes are hemi parasites: they make their own carbohydrates by photosynthesis, but acquire water and minerals by plumbing themselves into their host's vascular system with a fleshy, root-like "holdfast".

Generally foresters see these aerial squatters as tree killers.

"In most places, forest managers regard mistletoe as a destructive pest that should be removed," says Watson, who is based at Charles Sturt University in Albury, New South Wales. His research challenges this view and suggests the plants are overwhelmingly a force for good. "Wherever they grow, they bring life," he says.

"Mistletoes are the key to a rich and healthy forest. They are the engine that drives diversity from the forest floor to the canopy. "The biggest contribution mistletoe makes to the wealth of woodland life is the rain of leaves it drops to the ground," Watson argues.

"Mistletoe leaves are often twice as nutritious as those of their hosts and, unlike trees, mistletoes don't withdraw nutrients from their leaves before shedding them. Those leaves are packed with goodies," says Watson.

"This makes the leaf litter below a mistletoe-laden tree both deeper and richer than elsewhere, encouraging the proliferation of soil microbes and accelerating the recycling of nutrients that fuel the growth of plants."

#### HiArts 2013...... A Great Weekend!

Several people, including children proudly walked out of the HiArts Exhibition a week ago with their very own art work. An abstract of encaustic work, various woven objects made from straw, and the promise that their clay pot would be fired later.

Ember Fairbairn was a quiet operator. A skilled artist from Healesville, she showed enthusiastic children and adults the ancient art of "Encaustic" work, a method as old as the Egyptians. A mixture of wax and paint pressed, scraped and overlaid on board.



Others were deep in concentration, as Coral Robben our potter coached them about posture and pressure. People simply enjoyed the sensuousness of handling clay in different forms.

Meanwhile down under the trees, the energy and sounds of those working with Jo Bowman (all the way from Perth) drifted up to the hall, as she encouraged people to use their imagination as they made objects out of straw.

The HiArts Exhibition on the first weekend of March again illustrated what a small community can achieve. Forty artists exhibited around 140 art works. In addition to visual artistry, there was pottery, sculpture, and woodcraft, all of high quality and sensitively arranged by our regular curator Shanley McBurney.

For the first time workshops were held on digital photography. These were conducted by a professional photographer, Munique Reid, who encouraged people to take photos without using the automatic button, and introduced people to the many ways in which we can preserve our photos. Both workshops were planned for an hour but the interest continued for over two hours.



Of course what would HiArts be without the hospitality of good food, excellent local wine and coffee accompanied by the gentle harp of Adele Heritage. Nor would it be right without the variety of painted faces, assisted by our now experienced team of Laura Bennett and Imogen Geffert assisted by Kassie Shaw.

While this year numbers were down, sales of art work were well up. The opening night drew around 70 people including artists and local supporters. The Mayor of Murrindindi, John Walsh opened proceedings with his usual flare and understanding.

Over the next few months the HiArts Committee will evaluate the weekend and reflect on future plans.
