#### **CONVERSATIONS**

Stonemason, Blacksmith, Carpenter, Wheelwright, Artist, Weaver, Designer, Restorer, Collector, Restaurateur. Most of us would be happy to have one or perhaps two of these on our CV. 71 year old Ruffy resident, 'Taffy' Jukes can justifiably claim all these titles, but he's far too humble to ever do so.

Growing up in the Welsh town of Rhydlewis in Cardiganshire he was schooled under a local stonemason who taught him all the aspects of stone craft including house-building & dry-walling. After emigrating to WA in 1970, Taffy worked in Margaret River constructing stone buildings for the developing wineries of the region including Evans & Tate. After 5 years in WA he set out for Victoria where he built and operated Taffy's Restaurant at Longwood East. His next move was to a rough 50 acre block at the bottom of the Weibye Track at Ruffy where he still lives. His first abode was a slab & daub hut (that is still standing) and he then set to work to build his substantial stone home. Taffy Jukes was one of a number of Stonemasons working in the Strathbogies and over time he has been responsible for a large number of the fine stone structures in our district and beyond. He also trained many 'young fellas' in the craft such as Mark Noye who is now carving out a reputation of his own as a quality Stonemason.

One hour at Taffy's place is like a walk back through time. In the Blacksmith's

shop he handed me a small length of worked metal that he had just finished. Of course I immediately identified it as a foot peg for a penny farthing bicycle! What else? From there we wandered through the carpentry shop where there lay two woodenspoke steel rimmed wheels that he has recently manufactured for a 'bone-shaker' bicycle. Then on to the storage area that holds the Gypsy caravan style slip-on that he built from scratch to fit his Toyota ute. An identical but horse-drawn Gypsy caravan lives outside under cover, still awaiting its first road trip.

Taffy's lifetime as a Stonemason has taken its toll on his back and he can no longer do the heavy work, but everywhere you look there is evidence of his boundless energy; from the walls of neatly split & stacked firewood, to his fully restored vintage Bedford utility, to his raised-bed vegie garden. On entering his beautiful stone home, the treats continue. Taffy has his hand-built penny farthing on display (he once rode it all the way to Melbourne) and the loungeroom has examples of his hand woven 'rag' rugs that he has made from remnants of some of his old clothes.

After bidding him goodbye and heading back up the 'Weibye' I found myself reflecting on the unbridled talents of Taffy Jukes and, by comparison, my own inadequacy.


#### **RUFFY WEEKEND WALKERS**
