Know Your Weeds

Chilean Needle Grass - Nassella neesiana

Chilean Needle Grass is a tussock grass growing to about 1m in height with a loose flowering head to 40cm long. Flowers appear between March and August, which is the ideal time to control this invasive weed by either hand weeding or spot spraying with an appropriate herbicide. The leaves are up to 30cm long and 5mm wide and can be hairless, flat or slightly rolled.

The seeds are to be found in a raised crown consisting of a sheath with a ridge of small teeth that encircles the base of the awn (the awn is a long tail of seeds, that can be 60-90cms long). Each seed is 8-10mm long, pale brown, warty and hairless. Stem seed is also produced at swellings along the stem and the base of the leaves conceals these seeds.

This weed is a **Weed of National Significance** as it invades native grasslands and agricultural land and is difficult to selectively control.

It is easily spread by slashing or mowing or by cultivation as well as seed or plant pieces being carried on equipment, vehicles or machinery. Stock can eat the seeds and spread them as can farm produce.

As a perennial it lives for longer than a year.



BIRDS ON FARMS - 'YARRA TO YEA' WORKSHOP






Our workshop will explain the <u>'Birds on Farms: 'Yarra to Yea'</u> project, including the benefits of bird monitoring and how to get involved, offer advice and tips for providing habitat for birds on rural properties, a short tutorial on bird surveys and bird identification, followed by a 'practice' 20-minute bird survey at the Yea Wetlands.

BirdLife Australia's 'Birds on Farms: 'Yarra to Yea' project works with landowners to develop scientifically rigorous and fully costed habitat plans, to help to increase the quality, connectivity, and resilience of woodland habitat on private rural properties and surrounds.

Then the *Birds on Farms:* Yarra to Yea project is for you! We work with landowners (on any type of rural property) to develop scientifically rigorous and fully costed habitat plans and help source grants to fund their implementation. These habitat plans align with known conservation needs for threatened woodland birds, and will help increase the quality, connectivity, and resilience of woodland habitat on your property and surrounds.



As part of our project, we also carry out engagement activities and citizen-science data collection (on birds and their habitat) with local landholders and the wider rural community. FREE GREEN WASTE DISPOSAL IN APRIL

Until 30 April, you can dispose of your green waste for FREE at Council's Resource Recovery Centres in Alexandra, Yea, Kinglake, Eildon and Marysville.

This includes domestic quantities of grass clippings, leaves, garden trimmings, branches, and tree trunks.

For green waste to be acceptable, it must:

- not be mixed up with other materials.
- be no longer than 1.5 m in length and be less than 25 cm in diameter. Branches and stumps larger than this will continue to incur a fee.
