### Letter to the Editor

#### A big THANK YOU.

A few weeks ago, Sue and I hosted a small group of local people for a Sri Lankan lunch; the aim was to raise money for a charity in Sri Lanka, the Tea Leaf Trust (TLT), who run a number of campuses around the hill country tea estates in Sri Lanka.

"TLT run educational programmes for children and young people in Sri Lankan tea estates, lifting them and their families out of poverty through employment, further education, and training. The current constantly evolving economic situation in Sri Lanka, in particular, the high inflation and increased cost of living, is making it extremely difficult for our students to regularly attend school. They are being forced to choose between going to school and having enough food for their family".

"Tea Leaf Trust was founded by Yasmene Shah and Tim Pare, who travelled to the Sri Lankan tea estates in 2007 whilst on their honeymoon. Their romanticised picture of the tea estates was turned upside down when they witnessed the tragic conditions that Indian Tamil women work in, the poverty of their community and the hardship of their history. Yas and Tim decided to move their lives to Sri Lanka and do something about it."

"We exist to lift Sri Lankan Tea Estate communities out of extreme poverty. We created Tea Leaf Trust for the Indian Tamils of the tea estates who are deliberately kept as an uneducated and dependent workforce. 83% of tea estate women suffer domestic violence, 85% of male tea estate workers are alcoholics and youth suicide rates are disproportionately high."

"Tea Leaf Trust is a Sri Lankan-led charity that runs free, highquality education programmes for professional, personal and leadership development. All so that our youth alumni can lift their families out of extreme poverty and lead change from within the tea estates."

"14 years later Tea Leaf Trust has helped 39,182 youth through education with over 80% of young people progressing into employment, further education and training. Along the way, these young people have, in turn, supported 349,397 members of their communities."

The aim - purpose of this letter is to publicly say a very big thank you to all who attended and their generosity. ### **Know Your Weeds**

### Pampas Grass - Cortaderia Selloana

A standard feature of any 1970s suburban garden.

Pampas is an undeclared, but still invasive weed that can be hard to eradicate due to its fibrous rhizomes spreading in clumps up to 4 metres across and 3 metres deep, along with its flower plumes that are capable of producing 100.000 seeds that can be blown for several kilometres.

It is best described as a large tussock forming grass with long, narrow drooping leaves and white to pink clusters of flowers 30-90cm long, on stems 4 metres tall. These flowers appear between March and May.

Its leaves are bluish green above and dark green below, 2 metres long and tapering to a fine point with serrated edges.

As well as being spread by seed dispersal and rhizome invasion it can often be spread by careless disposal of garden waste.

The best time for eradication of this perennial weed is September to December with October and November being optimum - spot spraying (with appropriate herbicide) and mechanical removal are the most efficient methods of treatment.

Several of the Know Your Weeds articles featured in TGN in recent issues suggest spot spraying - with an appropriate herbicide - as a means to control and/or eradiate certain weed problems.

As the use of some chemicals is restricted in the Goulburn Broken Catchment (HCCC's home ground) you should always seek advice on the appropriate herbicide for your situation and use in accordance with the manufacturer's label.

### Sustainable Soils

Dear Granite News readers,

It's been a couple of busy weeks!

On the 31st of March I attended the Sustainable Soils Forum in Bendigo, hosted by the North Central Catchment Management Authority. The Honourable Penelope Wensley AC (National Soils Advocate) spoke about the fundamental need for more awareness of the importance of healthy soils for healthy communities, as soil health is recognised more and more to be connected to human health.

Soil is a fragile resource which is degraded in many parts of the world, a theme addressed in Dr Peter Dahlhaus's presentation (Principal Research Fellow, CeRDI).

According to the "Australia State of Environment Report" (2021), the overall state of soil health in Australia is poor, with main issues being land clearing, climate change and groundcover loss. In the intensive land-use zone, soil health is very poor (nutrient imbalance, soil structure decline and land-use intensification), and poor in the extensive land-use zone (grazing, clearing, climate change, groundcover loss).

Dr Dalhaus also offered a snapshot of all the resources available online to access information and data about soil, like Ansis (Australian National Soil Information System), Soil and Landscape Grid of Australia, Soil Health Knowledgebase, Soil Science Australia, and Victorian resources online.

The forum continued with presentations on how groups and individuals are working together to improve their soils, with the following speakers: Jade Killloran, Central Vic Regen Farmers group; Deane Belfield, Mt Alexander Regen Ag group; Danny Pettingill, Loddon Plains Future Farming group; Andrew Borg, Kara Kara Regen Ag group, and Jessica Conlan, Runnymede Farm, Elmore.

Next week I'll write about the Sustainable Agriculture Project forum in Dookie (20th of April), with presentations on soil carbon (including our HCCC project), soil acidity and biodiversity on farms.
