## **Know Your Weeds**

## Hawthorn - Crataegus Monogyna **Regionally Controlled Weed**

An erect deciduous, perennial shrub to 6m tall, Hawthorn bushes have white, cream or pink flowers 8-13mm in diameter that are strongly scented and occur in spring. They are to be found in clusters at the end of small branches.

The plant also produces fruit - deep red berries in clusters - that are about 8mm in diameter.

Leaves are green and vary from oval to triangular and are generally coarsely serrated. Its bark is rough at the base and smoother further up.

This plant provides harbour for pest animals and diseases such as Fire Blight and its seeds can be eaten or carried by birds and animals.

The optimum treatment time is from Oct - Feb and this can be done by spot spraying the foliage or cutting and painting the stump - both these require the application of an appropriate herbicide or by mechanical removal

# Seymour Urban Landcare receives grant for project on Gliders

We're delighted to announce that our project "Biolink Corridors for Gliders in Seymour" has been funded by the Victorian Government (DEECA, ex DELWP) through the Environmental Volunteering New Growth Project, and has received full support from the Mitchell Shire Council.

Seymour Urban Landcare will collaborate with BEAM (Mitchell Environmental Group) and the Victorian Biolinks Alliance to engage young people to learn more about gliders and to contribute to habitat restoration.

Many activities have already been planned: on the **9th June Chris Pocknee** (Ecologist, Biolinks Alliance) will deliver a talk on gliders at Seymour College, where VCAL students are already contributing to our project by building nest boxes during their woodwork class, thanks to their teacher David Stute.

On the **25th June there will be a planting day on Whiteheads Creek in Seymour**, and in August we will have spotlight walks along the creek, looking for gliders. In spring we will inspect 50 nest boxes that had been installed as part of a previous project on gliders (available <u>at this link</u>), when direct seeding was done along Lambing Gully Road to create a wildlife corridor.

#### **WOOLLY WANDERINGS**

I grew up surrounded by sheep, of course this was long before synthetics and our warm winter clothes were all wool. My father learnt to knit as a child, and one winter - he had broken a bone in his foot and couldn't attend to his usual farm operations - he knitted me a pair of socks! These I took to Dookie Agricultural College where I spent a year of my Agricultural Science degree.

The college footie team's colours were navy blue and red socks with red tops. So I knitted red tops for my father's socks - much admired by the students. An ex-serviceman, who had been part of a submarine crew in WWII offered to swap his woollen, orange balaclava for my socks - to the great satisfaction of us both.

Then in the 1960s and 1970s I ran a business making sheepskin jackets. The inspiration for this came from a Marcus Oldham student working for us for his prac year. He wanted something warm to wear on the tractor - no such things as air-conditioned cabins in those days. So off I went to a tannery in Melbourne and our student was delighted with the result. His brother wanted a similar jacket, followed by wives, girlfriends, etc.

I then discovered a tannery in New Zealand from where I imported beautiful skins - suede on the skin side, all dyed in colours such as dark brown, yellow, beige, etc. Over nearly 20 years I made 4,000 jackets which were sent all over the world - Antarctica to Alaska. Of course there were many offcuts and these I made into soft soled slippers, mittens, hats, even cases for glasses. All sold before they hit the cupboards!

The Americans loved a natural product and some even sent out their measurements <u>and</u> the money, sight unseen! I employed one local woman to help with the cutting out and acquired an industrial sewing machine as well as an overlocker (for slippers, etc).

Then along came synthetics with a vengeance and as I was nearly 60, I decided it was time to retire. So I just stopped. But what pleasure and social connections I made.

My son once came home from the Royal Melbourne Show and said, "Mum, there were 30 of your jackets round the Hereford ring!!" One daughter, travelling in Scotland, stayed overnight with a young man and in the course of conversation she mentioned the name 'Glentannar', our property in the Highlands. My business name was Glentannar Homecrafts. "Just a minute," he said and produced one of my jackets with label attached! An old school friend, ski-ing in Canada saw one of my jackets ski-ing down the slopes beside her!

And recently, to continue the woolly theme I found a 'spencer' (undergarment) with my mother's maiden name attached. She was married in 1925 so this article is nearly 100 years old. And what a joy to wear under my skivvy.

Now my son has developed extra super-fine wool, from which are made such things as raincoats, fine soft material for fashion clothes, etc for the 21st century.


# **Open Studio - Hillcrest Gallery**
