Know Your Weeds

Parthenium Weed (Parthenium hysterophorus) State Prohibited Weed

The Parthenium weed is a perennial plant, a prolific seeder and an aggressive coloniser producing 15,000 seeds per plant per year! In can also cause dermatitis and asthma in some people.

It is unlikely to be confused with any native species as it stands 1.5m tall with an erect stem and has deeply divided leaves, coloured pale green and covered in soft white hairs. The smaller leaves alternate up the stem while the base leaves can be 20cm in length.

Flower clusters appear between January and June at the top of the branches and are creamy white in colour and 4-10mm in diameter.

It can be spread in many ways - by water, by farm produce (grain or fodder) seed eaten by stock or via equipment and vehicles.

As a State Prohibited Weed DEECA is responsible for its control

Dear Editor Our SHARED significant landscape

Like many readers of The Granite News we have chosen to live at Highlands in the Southern Strathbogies because of the landscape we all love and enjoy.

The Shire of Mitchell has recognised the significance of our beautiful landscape and recently released a Landscape Assessment Study. It designated both the Stewart's Creek Valley and the Hughes Creek Valley as significant landscapes shown as area 5 on the accompanying plan. This same landscape character extends over both Strathbogie and Murrundindi Shires and covers most of the investigation area for the proposed FERA windfarm.


The significant landscape controls proposed by the Shire of Mitchell are to ensure that new structures are not located on prominent ridges and hill tops to protect this landscape character. Both the Shires of Strathbogie and Murrindindi need to undertake equivalent landscape assessments like the Shire of Mitchell.

Permits for wind energy facility developments are issued by the State Minister for Planning. The present State Policy for wind turbines has no recognition of the significance of the Strathbogies Landscape while recognising other places, including the Macedon Ranges and the Otway Coast, as unsuitable for wind energy facilities.


The question our community needs to ask is - Why all of our significant landscape is not worthy of protection?


What's this I hear about a windfarm in Highlands??

For those interested readers who haven't been able to attend any of the public meetings so far, this map gives an indication of the extent of the proposal.

Kong Meng Hill Trek

A guided walk highlighting some of the spectacular granite structures and native vegetation of the Strathbogie Ranges.

Saturday 17 June commencing 10.00 am from 1323 Tarcombe Road Avenel

We will meet at Stephen Onian's property 1323 Tarcombe Rd Avenel which is 13.2 km from the Hume Fwy. Look for the palm lined driveway. There is plenty of parking space near the house.

It is anticipated that the walk will start near the house site (360m) then across the creek and traverse a gentle slope to an elevation of 400m. The walk will then follow a westerly direction downhill to 220m elevation before climbing a steep slope east to 420m elevation, (great views of the surrounding hills to the south and east, as well as the riverine plains to the northwest) and then back to the house site.

Total walk is only 2.5-3 km but quite steep in places. The walk is graded as per the Australian Walking Track Grading System as Category 3 (suitable for most ages and fitness levels, tracks may have short steep sections, a rough surface, and many steps). The walk is unsuitable for children under 12 years.

As well as plenty of interesting granite there is also much for the botanically inclined. Plants you will see include Ausfeld's wattle (Acacia ausfeldii), Austral indigo (Indigofera australis), Hickory wattle (A. obliquinervia), Rock Isotome (Isotoma axillaris) and a giant Stringybark, possibly Cannon's Stringybark (E. macrorhyncha subsp. cannonii) which is normally restricted to NSW.

We are fortunate to have 3 knowledgeable guides (Neil Phillips, Stephen Onians and John Thompson) who between them can cover the geology, botany, and geography of the country we will be walking. Hopefully, we will also have some walkers who can fill us in about Kong Meng.

You will need to be reasonably fit to do the walk and will need to have good walking shoes or boots, loose fitting clothes, warm jumper, hat, sunscreen, and a waterproof jacket. Bring some sandwiches or snacks and water.

Please register your interest to take the walk by emailing Kevin Whithear **kgwhithear@gmail.com no later than 9 June 2023**. Please include your phone number and the names of any persons who will be accompanying you.

We prefer to limit the size of the walking group to 20 persons so places will be allocated on a first in basis. If registration is significantly oversubscribed, we may be able to organise an additional walk.
