Our "Biolink Corridors for Gliders in Seymour" Landcare Project

Last week I caught up with Lesley to assess a few sites for spotlight walks and nest boxes' inspection. It was a lovely afternoon with some much-appreciated winter sun filtering down amongst the trees. We met on Telegraph Rd, just outside Seymour, in front of what's been named "Lesley's Gate" by the locals, who have placed a bespoke timber sign on the fence. And in case you're wondering, the Lesley I caught up with was the same one honoured by the sign.

On the walking path, small, beautiful mushrooms pop up from the bare soil, attracting our attention. Since I've started learning more about fungi, thanks to the recent Festival in Euroa and Alison Pouliot's books, I can appreciate not only their elegant appearance, but also their underground contribution that keeps the bush healthy. Lesley pointed out to me a few mighty old trees, and we decided that it's the perfect place to host a spotlight walk and look for gliders.

Our reconnaissance tour proceeded by car along Telegraph Rd, then slowly over the Whiteheads Creek (that flows right on top the road), and along Lambing Gully Rd. All along the way I spotted many nest boxes, painted in dark green, that have been installed about 7 years ago by our Landcare facilitator Janet Hagen. A big sign explains the whole project, under the title 'Corridors for Life'.



It's now time to check if these nest boxes need any repair, and to discover who's living in there; surely there should be some gliders, but Lesley observes that there's not much understory, mostly golden wattles and a few black wattles, that are both short-lived trees.

I take notes of all this information, as I want to learn all about it. Would the Euroa Arboretum have some more wattles that we could plant in here? And a couple of phone calls later we were on our way to organising a new planting day for the upcoming National Tree Day. Just a small one, with freshly baked scones (I was promised!) and only 100 trees to plant.

It hasn't been formally confirmed yet, but you can already save the date, **Saturday 29th of July**, and as soon as possible we will confirm further details. Know Your Weeds

Camelthorn (Alhagi maurorum) State Prohibited Weed

Camelthorn is an erect spiny shrub to 1.5m tall with leaves up to 2.5cms long that are pale green and usually solitary or at the base of the spines.

It produces clusters of red-brown pea like flowers 7-10cm long on short branches during late spring to summer.

The stems are rigid, with many branches bearing spines with golden tips 1 - 2.5cm long and the well-defined seeds can be found in reddish - brown pods 2.5cm long.

This is a hardy, perennial and vigorous plant with an extensive root system which might be confused with native bitter-pea species.

It can be spread by slashing and mowing or with seed or plant pieces carried on equipment, vehicles or machinery as well as in contaminated soil.

Its eradication is the responsibility of DEECA and the optimum time is spring through to summer.

partnership with Goulburn Broken CMA, would like
to get it happening again very soon.

Euroa Arboretum - Growing back the bush

We urgently need to upscale the capacity to harvest native seed for large, biodiverse projects. Wild populations alone will not meet the demand for seed and currently we don't come close to harvesting enough seed for large revegetation projects.

In 2024, we aim to plant 13 hectares, (7,000 plants) of seed production orchard at Murchison to enable easy, large scale seed harvesting. This will double our current annual seed harvesting capacity – a predicted extra 120kg of seed.

A \$40 sponsorship will cover the cost of 1 plant for 3 years. This includes the planning, planting and maintenance over 3 years for each plant.




How is it that not enough natural seed can be harvested?
