Refreshments will follow.



New events for the project "Biolink corridors for gliders in Seymour"

Dear Granite News readers, while everyone seemed to be on holiday in Italy over winter, I've been quite busy organising new events for our Gliders' project! Let's have a look at what's on the calendar.

Wattle-planting day: Sunday 20th of August - 10 am- 12:30 pm on Telegraph Rd, Seymour (see p.4) We'll be planting 100 acacia trees (Acacia pycnantha and Acacia implexa), and once they're grown they will contribute to provide food for gliders in this green corridor, where nest boxes had been previously installed. We will meet on Telegraph Rd between the intersection with Kobyboyn Rd and the creek (cattle yards on your left 100 m north of the intersection with Kobyboyn Rd). We'll be all in Hi-Vis, so you cannot miss us! And a traffic management plan has been organised by the Shire to allow us to work in the safest possible way. Parking is available along the road and closer to the cattle yards. We'll be happy to see you there even if you come just for the company, a friendly chat, and a picnic!

Spotlight walks at twilight: looking for gliders and learning about citizen science.

These walks will be guided by Ecologist Chris Pocknee from the Biolink Alliance, our partner in this project. Chris will bring a video camera and a thermal scope, that detects infra-red light. Other experts will be there to provide extra support during the walk and to show us how we can contribute to citizen science projects by recording our sightings with a GPS tracker. Bring your own torch where possible; we have 6 head torches to share and a few more hand torches. Please wear warm clothes and sturdy shoes/ boots. Dates and locations may be subject to change, in which case we'll send you an update (please check your email or our Facebook page).

Friday 25th August at 5:45 pm, meeting at the end of Bolton St, off Emily St, in Seymour.

We will walk on a path along the Goulburn River up to where the Whiteheads creek merges in (about 500 m). Level of difficulty: low, suitable for everyone. Watch out if wondering away from the path at dark, as there's steep banks going straight into the river. Parking is available at the end of Bolton St (no through road), or nearby along Hanna St.

Thursday 31st August at 5:45 pm, meeting at Seymour Bushland Park, Telegraph Rd entrance.

How to get there: from Seymour take the Goulburn Valley Highway towards Yea; past the Golf Course turn left into Telegraph Rd and after 1.3 km you'll see a gate on your left. The gate will be open to allow for more parking spaces. We will walk on a path inside the reserve (fenced area), where there's a few old trees with hollows, ideal for spotting some gliders. Low level of difficulty, suitable for everyone. The length of the walk will vary according to circumstances. Watch out for tripping hazards, especially if wandering away from the path and into the bush.

Saturday 2nd of September at 5:45 pm, meeting at the end of Anglesey St (off Anzac Avenue).

We will walk down to the Goulburn River, on a slope and uneven terrain and then on a path along the river for 1 km or more, according to circumstances. Participants can decide to leave earlier and go back to Anglesey St, if they have their own torch. Compared to the previous ones, this walk will be a bit longer and may present more tripping hazards.

Hope to see you there! Let's keep up the good work.



Letter to the Editor

We have just conducted another community meeting on 12th August at the Molesworth Hall to let the local community know what is going on with FERA's proposal to build an industrial scale wind energy facility and associated high voltage transmission lines.

The meeting was well attended by landowners from the surrounding area, many of whose families have lived in the area for generations.

As with our recent meeting at Highlands the audience was mostly new faces, which is good to see. Also, in common with Highlands was the community attitude toward FERA, they feel that they have not been well informed by FERA and have many serious concerns as a result.

It was clear from discussions at the meeting that the threat of compulsory acquisition is a major concern to all property owners in the proposed transmission line corridor. FERA have stated that they can not compulsorily acquire land as they are a private company, but the fear is that FERA will convince the government to partner with or take over the project and force the lines through.

We will try to find out more information about this possibility and keep you informed of the situation. Also of great concern is that FERA continue to misrepresent the position of other property owners in their discussions. The only way to know what your neighbours think about the FERA proposal is to talk with them and discuss it. Don't take FERA's word for it, check for yourself.

FERA have also announced that they will be hosting another community meeting.

There will be 2 meetings held on the 26th of August.

The Ruffy meeting will be held from 10am to 12pm at the Ruffy Town Hall.

The Upton Hill meeting will be held from 2pm to 4pm at the Upton Hill CFA.

It has already been suggested to FERA that they hold a single meeting in a more convenient location, but this request has fallen on deaf ears.

The Seymour Wind Farm investigation area is bounded by Avenel, Longwood, Ruffy, Highlands and Tarcombe. The proposed project represents an opportunity in the transition from coal power sources in accordance with Victoria's renewable energy targets of 40% by 2025 and 50% by 2030.



Know Your Weeds

Bindweed (Convolvulus arvensis)

(aka Field Bindweed, Morning Glory)

Bindweed is a twining herb that can grow up to 2m long and be either a prostrate or a climbing plant.

Its flowers only last one day and can be coloured white to dark pink, up to 3cm in diameter and funnel shaped. They appear from Spring to early Autumn.

Leaves are arrow-shaped, dark green, 2-5cm long and alternate on short stalks.

Bindweed is a strong competitor in cropping situations where its extensive root system robs desirable plants of moisture and although it is similar to native Bindweed it is generally much larger.

It easily spread from seed and root pieces that can be transported by slashing/mowing, carried on vehicles or machinery or with seed eaten and carried by stock and/or birds and other animals.

As a perennial weed, hand weeding or spot spraying between November and March are the best control options.
