Threatened Species Day - 7th September

Threatened Species Day was declared in 1996 to commemorate the 60th anniversary of the death of the last remaining Tasmanian Tiger (also known as the Thylacine) in Hobart in 1936.

Threatened Species Day is a time to reflect on what happened in the past and how similar fates to the thylacine could await other native plants and animals unless appropriate action is taken.

On 7 September 1936 only two months after the species was granted protected status, 'Benjamin', the last known thylacine, died from exposure at the Beaumaris Zoo in Hobart. While it is estimated there were around 5000 thylacines in Tasmania at the time of European settlement, excessive hunting, combined with factors such as habitat destruction and introduced disease, led to the rapid extinction of the species, along with a bounty introduced in the 1830s.

The name thylacine roughly translates (from the Greek via Latin) as 'dog-headed pouched one'. The world's largest marsupial carnivore, the thylacine was commonly known as the Tasmanian Tiger, due to the distinctive stripes on its back. Despite its fierce reputation, the tiger was semi-nocturnal and was described as quite shy, usually avoiding contact with humans.

The fossilised remains of thylacines have been found in Papua New Guinea, throughout the Australian mainland and Tasmania. Indigenous drawings in

Kakadu have been dated to 6,000 years ago.

Know Your Weeds

Alligator Weed (Alternanthera Phioloxeroides) Weed of National Significance!

Alligator weed is generally aquatic but can be terrestrial. It forms a free-floating mat or can be rooted to soil.

It is a highly invasive and destructive weed, choking waterways, depleting oxygen and collecting sediment.

Its flowers are generally produced from January to March with silver/white flowerheads 1.2 to 1.4cm in diameter o stems 2-7cms tall that grow from the leaf joins. The veined leaves are smooth and waxy and about 2-7cms long, growing in opposite pairs along the main stem.

It is a perennial plant and can be spread by by water and boat movements. As it is a State Prohibited Weed its control, between November and April, is done by DEECA.

Letter to the Editor

FERA held their third round of community information meetings on Saturday 26th August at Ruffy and Upton Hill.

A summary of the preliminary environmental survey was presented by Inka Veltheim from Biosis. The initial survey has identified a number of threatened and endangered species of flora and fauna across the area proposed for development by FERA. The initial survey was mostly done by reviewing existing data sources such as the Victorian Biodiversity Atlas.

Further field studies will be conducted over the next 12 to 24 months to provide more details. Inka commented that even if a particular species is not actually recorded during the surveys, if the habitat for that species is found then it is most likely that the species would actually be there and would be recorded as such. Inka also said that based on the initial survey it is most likely that a full Environmental Effects Statement would be required due to the threatened species already identified and the size of the proposed development.

FERA agreed to a request in the meeting that they ensure that there was transparency in the design of the ecological surveys and that they implement a meaningful process for anyone in the community to provide input into the design. This would ensure that the surveys were conducted across a wide enough area and at appropriate times (eg to capture seasonal movements) to capture a representative sample of all the threatened and vulnerable ecological communities. Biosis were very receptive to having community input into their research, acknowledging the deep understanding that landholders have of the biodiversity on their properties.

We continue to encourage everyone to log observations of any interesting flora and fauna into iNaturalist, as Biosis will be using this data as well as data from other State and National biodiversity databases.

FERA then presented an overview of climate change and the need for renewable energy, a topic which the local community is already fully aware of and has no argument with, but unfortunately FERA did not provide any further information about their actual project other than that they may opt to construct multiple 132kV transmission lines along the roadsides to reach the main transmission line near Alexandra. Such a proposal should be strongly discouraged as it would require an easement of approx. 45m wide along the route of the transmission lines, leading to removal of almost the entire roadside remnant vegetation across the project area.

Those who attended the meetings left disappointed that FERA continue to treat the community with disrespect by withholding almost all information about their project and not engaging in an open discussion.

Hi Laura,

Please see below.

The label referred to is the Australian Recycling Label that is slowing being rolled out on all packaging across Australia to help residents pick the right bin. The imaging, below, can mean slightly different things but identifies how each part of the packaging can be disposed of.

The far left filled in recycling symbol means, the box in this case, can be placed in the recycling bin. The clear recycling symbol in the middle means the material can be recycled if the additional instruction is followed and the bin symbol means that part of the packaging must be placed in the red bin.
