- 1. What does HCCC stand for? and
- 2. What does the HCCC do? so it's probably time for an encore.

The Hughes Creek Catchment Collaborative, the publisher of The Granite News, is a Landcare Network combining the Highlands, Whitehead's Creek, Upper Hughes Creek & Hughes Creek Landcare Groups. It is based in the southern Strathbogie Ranges, Central Victoria Upland Slopes and covers the localities of Ruffy, Terip, Caveat, Highlands, Dropmore, Tarcombe, Kobyboyn and Whitehead's Creek.

Formed in 1994, the Hughes Creek Catchment Collaborative (HCCC) has evolved from various Rabbit Action Groups and Landcare Groups that started in the 1980s. Landcare enables people to do something practical about protecting & restoring Australia's unique environment.

Landcare members have control in setting the activities and the focus that HCCC wishes to pursue however these activities must be in line with the Landcare ethic - "A caring attitude & a wish to pass our planet onto the next generation in a healthier state than we find it in today."

HCCC strives to provide a supportive environment which provides local people with the opportunity to come together, share knowledge and experiences and to do something practical to improve the long-term health of our land. It promotes the sustainable production of high quality food and fibre and supports the maintenance of a farm's productive capacity through the implementation of environmental best practice farming techniques and the apt adoption of sustainable farming technologies. It also aims to support smaller, new and absentee landholders with alternative lifestyle aspirations in the management of their land for better environmental outcomes.

Our Landcare network's activities include pest plant and animal control, biodiversity conservation, waterway management, revegetation, soil health management, protection of endangered species plus community welfare and education. The executive committee consists of two nominated representatives from each Landcare group plus the President and vacancies currently exist.

All landholders who participate in Landcare activities are considered to be ordinary members of the group along with any TGN readers who indicate that they wish to be considered members in support of the HCCC's objectives. (Just send an email to editor@tgn.org.au if that applies to you - if you haven't already) There are no membership fees. NB: a survey for HCCC communities will soon be available for readers to complete. It will inform the HCCC's future directions.

TERIP TERIP CFA - hold a night of Celebrations!

On September 9th we held the Terip Terip CFA awards night and dinner.

- 50 people in attendance, community members and brigade members
- we recognised an astonishing 1154 years of service to the Victorian Community
- District 12 Assistant Chief Fire Officer (ACFO) Rob van Dorsser was presenting awards. In his speech ACFO van Dorsser said:

"With 55 brigade members, including 38 Firefighters, you've responded to 85 Fires and other emergencies in the last 5 years. For a Class One, Rural Fire Brigade, that's a really great effort! By our records, there have been only 10 Captains between 1945 and 2023, a sign of consistency, continuity and true commitment. And that this year, you have elected the brigade's first female Captain, Shannon Roach, shows Terip Terip is progressive and inclusive which is something to be really proud of".

HCCC, Euroa Arboretum, SRCMN & Longwood Plains CMN are combining to put together a bid for a Victoria Landcare New Futures Project trial to be based in our area.

We are looking for ten landholders or rural businesses interested in the following topics

- Assisting next generation and early adopter farmers to find pathways to new "green" markets.
- Protecting and enhancing spring soaks, perched bogs, farm dams and waterways with perennial native vegetation cover.
 - Decreasing the impact of drought, flooding and soil erosion through ecological engineering solutions.
- Building farm soil water holding capacity by increasing fungi, bacteria and microrobe activity.
- Designing wildlife refuge areas and "Glideways" corridors along waterways and away from roadsides.



Are you interested in adding to the iNatutaliste's environmental knowledge base of the local HCCC area?

If **YES** then download the App now, follow the instructions for use in **TGN 30/7/23**, and start recording our unique natural wonders of both fauna and flora. It's an incredibly valuable resource.

WOW!! What a response!

Since local environmentalist Sam Strong offered a couple of sessions on how to use the i-Naturalist app to record local species of plants and animals it has "taken off like a bomb"!

The Strathbogie Ranges Nature Atlas Project now has over 5,200 entries on it which is an incredible effort from the surrounding community. It seems that many people are really interested in their local environment, as well as who or what they share their unique patch of bushland with.

More importantly such records form a data base that can be used to locate threatened and/or endangered species and then have measures put in place to stop them from becoming extinct.

The top observations so far, across all species - from birds to reptiles, from mammals/marsupials to monotremes and from butterflies to botanicals are -

Koalas - 118 Echidnas - 74 Wedge-tailed Eagles - 52 Bare-nosed Wombat - 36 Crimson Rosella - 31

It's great to see koalas right up there, given the situation in NSW where global warming is impacting their survival there thanks to either uncontrollable wildfires or dehydration due to less moisture content in gum leaves.

Other species of interest sighted in smaller, but still encouraging, numbers are the Yellow-tailed Black Cockatoo, Gang-gang Cockatoo, Tawny Frogmouth, Brush-tailed Phascogale, Southern Boobook, Sugar Glider, Greater Glider, Sacred Kingfisher, Rakali, Platypus, Spotted and Striated Pardalotes, Chocolate Lily, Murnong (Yam) and Kangaroo Grass to name just a few of the **1,456 species** recorded so far.

Of course it's useful to note that Sambar Deer, Rabbits, St John's Wort, Spear Thistle, Cape Weed and Paterson's Curse share our patch too and need to be eradicated. (More on p.4 for doing just that to Paterson's Curse)

However, in the meantime keep loading those sightings onto i-naturalist, it's a great resource for our local area.

NOW is the time to hit Paterson's Curse!

It's Pato spraying time and HCCC are looking for Expressions of Interest from anyone who would like to join HCCC in spraying this very noxious weed. This year we are planning a more targeted course of action.

- Instead of helicopter spraying we are planning to use drones as drones can fly very low and target plants in difficult to get at places.
- HCCC will pay 50% of chemicals costs up to 6 drone loads.
- HCCC will pay \$3,000 in total for the drone hire.

Beautiful Bambi or Persistent Pest?

"Deer are the worst emerging feral animal threat facing Australia, according to Peter Jacobs from the Invasive Species Council.

A recent report estimated they are running up a national damage bill of \$91 million, mainly to agricultural pastures.

Victoria's latest deer management plan, released in 2022, is based on an "asset protection" approach for much of the state.

"It's called a biosecurity approach. It is about trying to be strategic and put the resources where they really need to be focused on," Mr Jacobs says.

"The problem is that it's been 150 years of deer numbers growing, and we now need a plan to control these feral animals.

"That should have been done a long time ago and while the investment by government is welcomed, it is clearly not enough. It's really just working around the edges."

Deer in Victoria are regulated through conflicting pieces of legislation, as the late Philip Ingamells, a respected park protection officer for Parks Victoria, explained to a Senate inquiry in 2018:

"You have the Wildlife Act, which effectively protects deer as a game species, requiring an authorisation if you are going to control them. Then you have the Flora and Fauna Guarantee Act, which lists deer as a potentially threatening process, but that's a fairly toothless act. However, you do have the National Parks Act. The National Parks Act is actually a very strong and very powerful act. It's been around since 1975, and it quite specifically empowers the park agency to control or eradicate exotic species."

Recent data published by the Invasive Species Council shows aerial shooting is the most effective control method for large-scale removal of feral animals, accounting for 88 per cent of the 271,959 pigs, deer, goats, foxes, and cats killed in the past three years.

The council believes the Victorian government urgently needs to remove the protected status of deer.

"This is really important, not just so they can be dealt with like a pest, but at the moment we've got this really confused position in the community where some people see deer as being a pest and an annoyance while the neighbour next door thinks they're cute," Mr Jacobs says."

Know Your Weeds

Ivy-leaf Sida (Malvella leprosa)

State Prohibited Weed

Ivy-leaf Sida is a perennial, deep-rooted, semierect herb that is highly competitive and difficult to kill

It grows up to 30cm tall with a silver/green appearance due to the fine hairs that cover its leaves.

Flowers appear in summer and have 5 small petals that are creamy yellow in colour and found in clusters at the end of the branches.

Its leaves have short stalks and are fan shaped with prominent veins on the undersides. The plant's stems are slender and light green can be either erect or prostrate.

The best time to eradicate is from October until April but as a State Prohibited Weed the control is the responsibility of DEECA so if any landholders notice this weed on their properties they need to contact DEECA immediately.

Ivy-leaf Sida can be spread in a variety of ways including - by water, by slashing and mowing, by contaminated soil and by machinery, equipment and vehicles.
